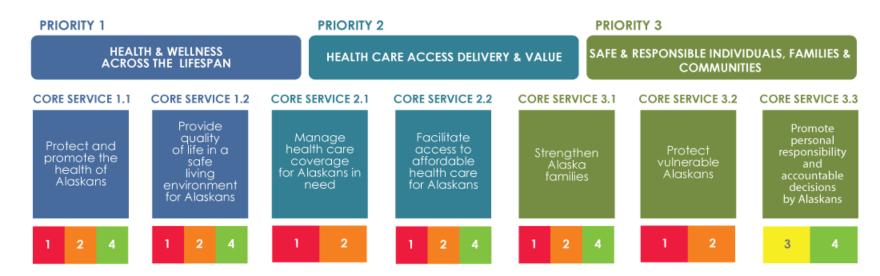
# Division Overview

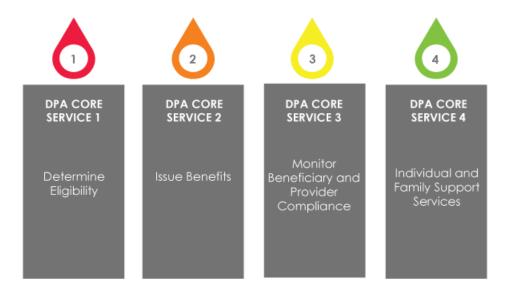
- Mission: To Promote self-sufficiency and provide for basic living expenses to Alaskans in need

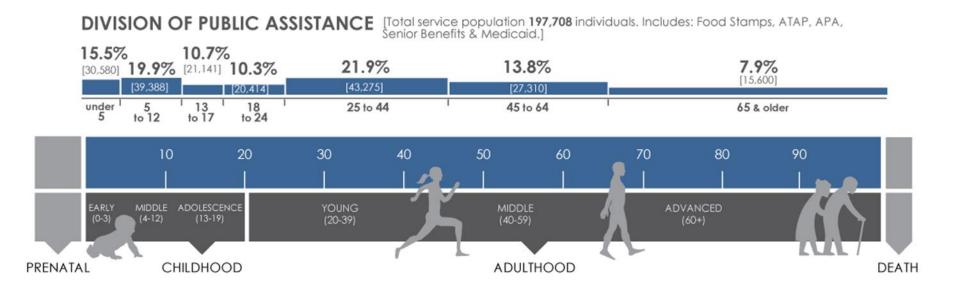

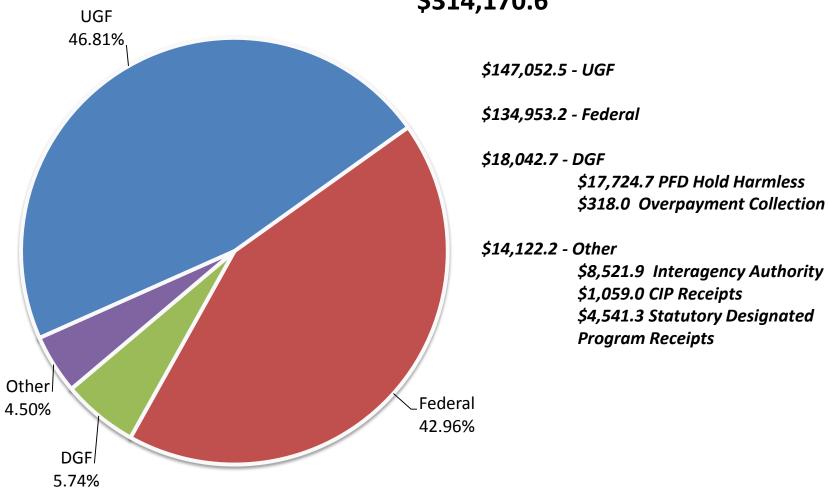

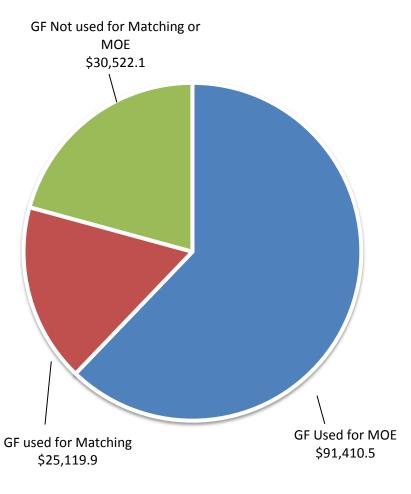
# Impacts of Eliminating the Alaska Heating Assistance Program

- The federal Low Income Heating Assistance Program (LIHEAP):
  - 9,183 households in FFY2015
  - \$1,174 average annual household benefit
- The Alaska Heating Assistance Program (AKAHP) is a state funded program:
  - 1,763 households in SFY2015
  - 151-225% of poverty level
    - Household of 1 = Gross monthly up to \$2,758
    - Household of 18 = Gross monthly up to \$19,335
  - Overall reduction in caseload of 20% since SFY2013.
  - \$560 average annual household benefit

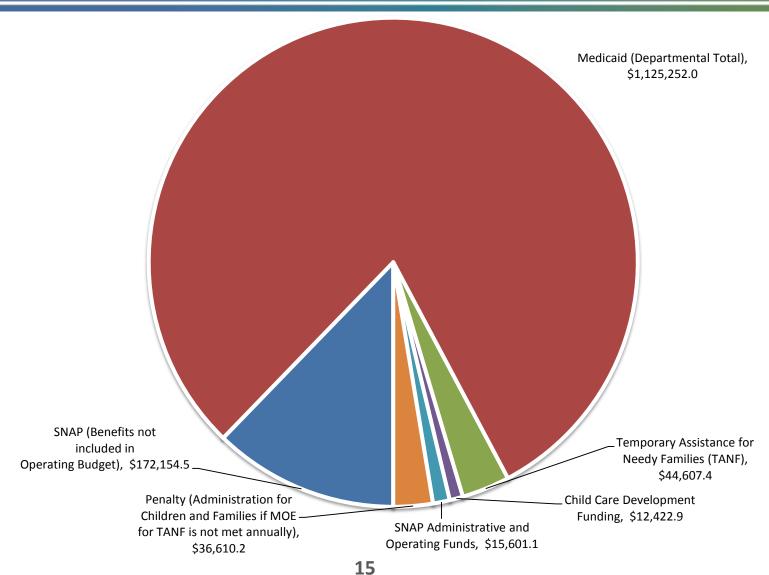

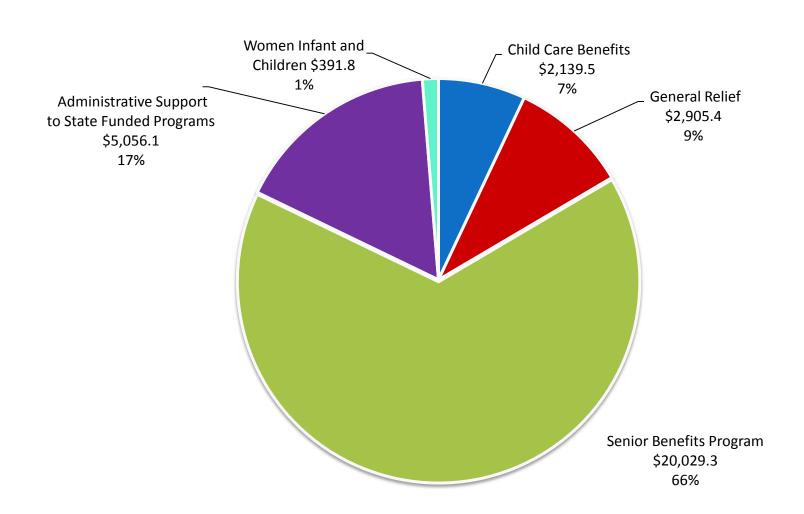

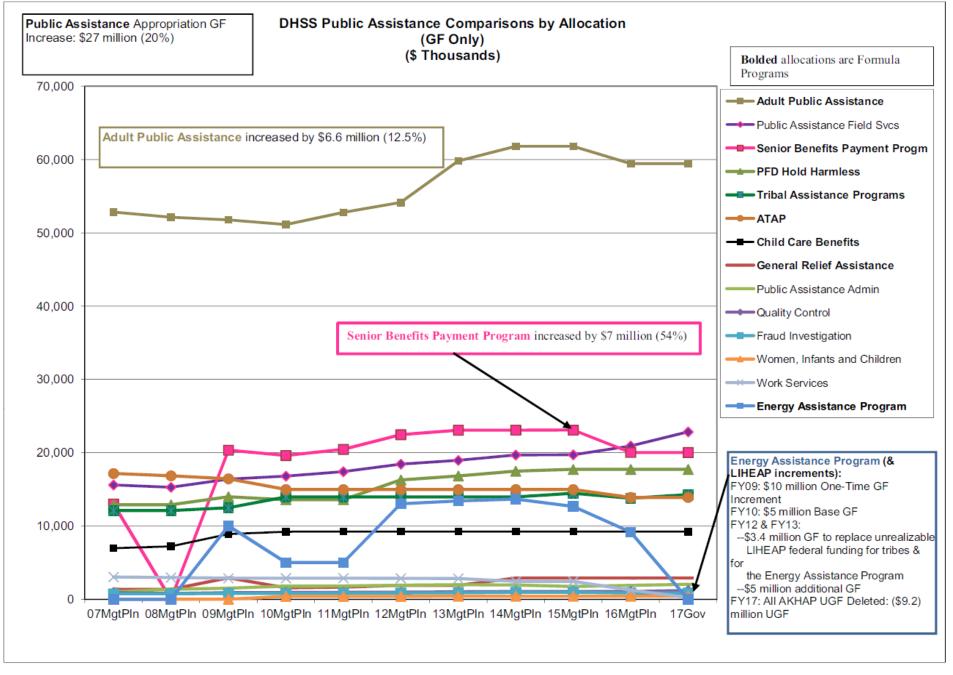

### Federal Revenues at Risk if Maintenance of Effort and **Matching Requirements Are Not Met** \$1,406,648.0

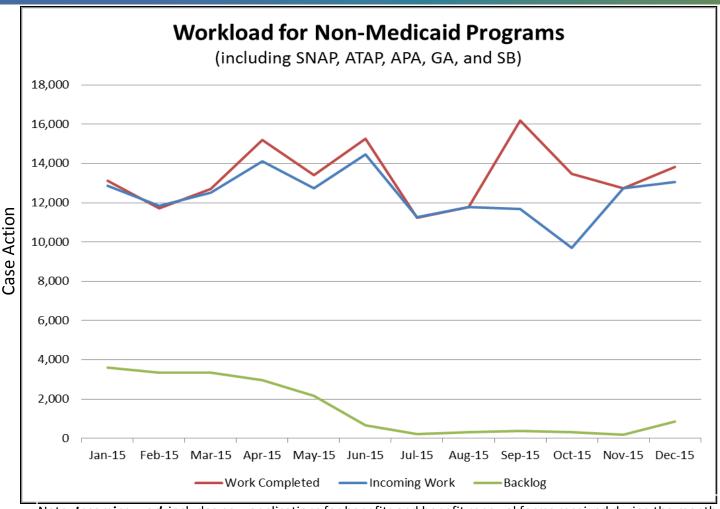


# Unrestricted General Funds not used for MOE or Matching \$30,522.1



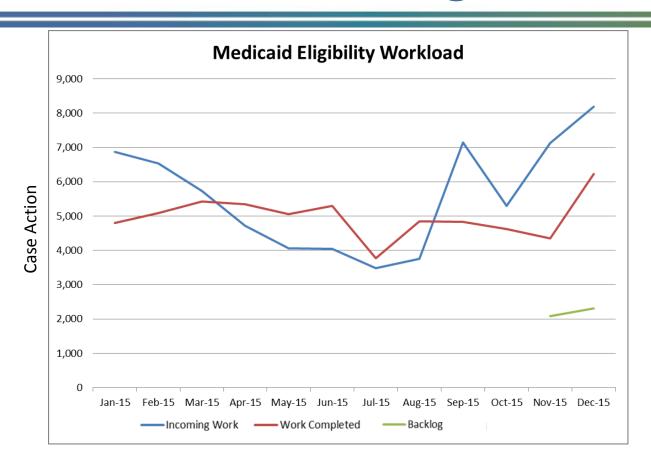


# Workload Progress

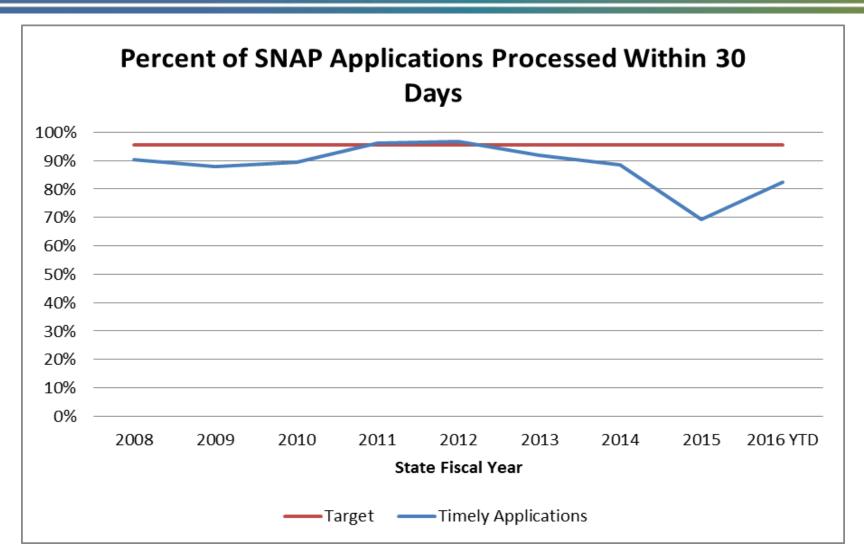

**Backlog** is unprocessed applications that do not contain recipients currently receiving Medicaid coverage. These applications are over 45 days old.

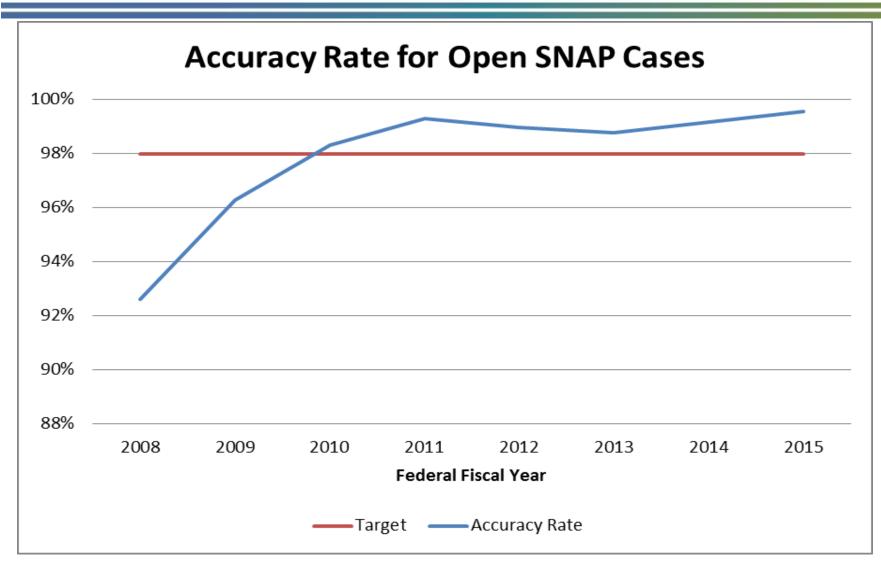

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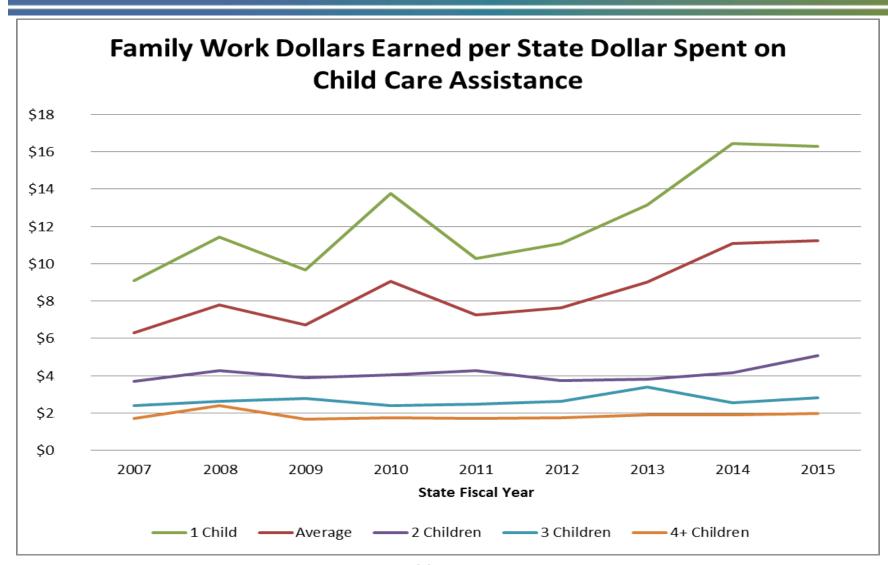

# Recent Successes

# "Economic Impact of Early Care and Learning in Alaska" October 2015 - Final Report found:

- \$512 million in economic activity in Alaska
- \$343 million in annual spending
- \$2 billion dollars in wages Alaskans earn due to access to child care
- Supports 15% of the Alaskan resident workforce in being able to work
- 7,700 jobs for caregivers and others

 UGF savings of \$4,218.0 through a successful partnership with nonprofit entities.

# Current Challenges

- 46% of parents with children under 6 years of age report difficulty in finding care
- Average annual wages in the Alaska child care sector 40% (\$20,676) of average statewide annual wages (\$52,848):
  - entry-level workforce
  - high turnover
  - poor continuity of care for children.

# Current Challenges

- Cost of quality care:
  - Basic Quality Licensed Care- \$740 per child/month
  - High Quality Licensed Care- \$970 per child/month
- Federal requirements for the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG)
  - health and safety inspections for approximately 275 additional child care providers
  - pre-service and ongoing training requirements for additional child care providers.

# Major Policy Issues

- Senior Benefits Reduction takes effect on March 1, 2016.
- Federal Misalignment of SNAP and Medicaid Policy

# Moving Forward

- Business Process Redesign
- Call Center/Call System
- Electronic Document Management Tool
- Workload Management Tool
- Alaska's Resource for Integrated Eligibility Services (ARIES)
- Women, Infant and Children's program is mandated to fully implement the Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) system by 2020.
