FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2015 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

BILL NO. HB126

Analysis

House Bill 126 (version W) would substantially revise and expand AS 26.05 by adding a new article, Alaska's Code of Military Justice. It provides substantive law and procedures for military courts martial and a new Military Appeals Commission within the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs. AS 26.05.490.

HB 126 also provides that after a person has appealed a court martial to the Military Appeals Commission, the person (if a sentence of confinement was imposed) has the right to further appellate review in the Alaska Court of Appeals. AS 26.05.493. This new type of appeal from the military court to the state civilian court would expand the state Court of Appeals' jurisdiction. Section 1; AS 22.07.020.

The Court of Appeals currently has jurisdiction over all state criminal appeals from the lower state trial courts. The bill would require the Court to accept appeals from cases involving violations of military law, rather than state law. The state Court of Appeals does not currently have familiarity with either substantive or procedural aspects of courts martial, since the court has not previously handled those case types.

The Court of Appeals judges will hear and decide this new category of cases, but the court system does not have verifiable information about the number of state court cases this new law may lead to, and each of these cases will necessarily involve the new, unfamilair body of law. To effectively research the new substantive laws, learn about procedures and due process owed to persons accused in a court martial, and resolve these new case types fairly, the court system anticipates that it would need an additional law clerk, particularly if the number of new military cases appealed to the Court of Appeals under HB 126 is more than a very small number.

This one new law clerk position carries a personal services expense of \$73,400 annually. (Law clerks do not participate in PERS and have lower costs for benefits than regular full-time employees; this position is therefore more economical than, for example, a staff attorney.) The Services amount on the note of \$3,500 per year covers software licenses for products such as Microsoft Office, WordPerfect, and the costs of the court's case management system software. The Commodities amount is \$6,500 for the first year; this amount is for a desk, computer, printer, books, and general office supplies for the new law clerk position. After the initial year of equipping the office, the Commodities cost becomes \$2,000 per year to cover ongoing consumable general office supplies, legal resources such as subscription costs, and other miscellaneous supplies.

In sum, this fiscal note reflects the total costs to the Alaska Court System of hiring and retaining one new law clerk on the Court of Appeals to process the cases that would come to it under the Code of Military Justice established in HB 126.
