
# Our People Alaskans Serving Alaskans

Created over 50 years ago by Ch88 SLA 1961 - (AS 37.15.410-550)














### Operating Agreement with Carriers

- Ten-year Operating Agreement commenced July 1, 2013
  - 29 Airlines are Signatory
  - Signatory Carriers
    - Share financial risk in exchange for capital and operating input
    - Discounted fees
- Signatory Carriers organize and engage AIAS as Airline Airport Affairs Committee (AAAC)
  - Co-chairs are representatives from UPS and Alaska Airlines
- AIAS has authority to issue revenue bonds

- Funded from Customer Charges -




### Cargo/Pax Activity

## AIAS FY13- FY17 YTD Monthly Reported Combined Cargo - Pax CMGTW As of December 31, 2016




## Passenger Activity




#### FY2018 DOT&PF Results Delivery Units (RDU)

#### **Unrestricted General Funds**



**Total Increment Request: \$2,590.8 Intl Airport Receipt Authority** 

 International Airport System increases for maintenance and security contracts, deicing chemicals, wildlife mitigation, safety supplies, feasibility study (OTI) and records management

#### Aviation Challenges - Future

- Fleet Changes
  - International wide-body aircraft
  - In-state changes (SAAB 2000, 737 freighter, Q-400)
- Climate Change
  - Increasing number of freezing rain/ice events
  - Runway subsurface maintenance
  - Coastal erosion
- Ever-increasing federal compliance requirements
  - Access controls/ID management
  - Obstruction criteria
  - Friction requirements
  - National Environmental Policy Act determination requirements for non-Airport Improvement Program development
