FY2018 Public Assistance Overview

- Mission: To Promote self-sufficiency and provide for basic living expenses to Alaskans in need.
- 557 Positions: 548 PFT / 8 PPT / 1 NP
- \$305,089.0 (\$136,331.1 UGF) FY2018 Governor Budget Request
- Total Unduplicated Recipients FY2016 216,781+



Budget Reductions and Impacts

Unrestricted General Fund Reduction*	\$28,959.5 ↓	17.5% ↓
Permanent Full Time Position Decrease*	9 ↓	1.6% ↓


- Burial assistance expenditures have been reduced by \$100.0 a month during FY2017. Fewer families are found eligible.
- The General Fund portion of the Heating Assistance Program ended at the end of FY2016. Benefits ended for 1,373 Alaskans.
- Senior Benefits payments to the highest earning seniors has gone from \$125 a month to \$76 a month. Approximately 5,000 seniors impacted each month.
- Caseloads have increased by 23% between SFY 2015 and 2017.







How Division of Public Assistance Will Use FY2018 Unrestricted General Funds



If Maintenance of Effort (MOE) and Matching Requirements are **not** met, the State of Alaska loses approximately \$1.4 Billion in Federal Funding.

Funding loss would impact:

- (1) Medicaid
- (2) Temporary Assistance for Needy Families
- (3) Child Care Development




FY2018 Governor's Operating Budget Decrements / Increments

Public Assistance Field Services	\$(100.0) FED	Reduce Authority for Travel Restriction Efficiencies




Who Public Assistance Serves

Program Integrity

- The Fraud Control Unit's combined total dollar value of cost avoidance, fraud claims established, and direct savings from imposed disqualification periods for all SFY 2016 investigations totaled over \$5.5 million.
- The Claims Unit was able to collect over \$1.1 million of incorrect payments for all programs.
- We have increases in the number of Fair Hearing requests disputing agency caused overpayments, and the number of claims to be processed is taxing our claims unit staff.



Looking Forward

- Implementing a Virtual Contact Center (VCC) and electronic document management system.
- Implementing Business Process Redesign in field service offices.
- Further reduce travel costs associated with training.
- Women, Infants and Children has begun the implementation phase of a federal mandate requiring a transition to electronic benefits issuance (EBT).
- Developing a plan to diminish the backlog in a methodical way with the influx of applications and renewals.
- Eligibility information system development and update.
