OUTCOME 1: ALASKA NATIVE CHILDREN ARE PREPARED FOR KINDERGARTEN

INDICATOR

The percentage of students prepared for kindergarten, as demonstrated with an overall score of 20 or more on the Alaska Developmental Profile (ADP).






CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK





KINDERGARTEN PREPAREDNESS KEY ISSUES





THINGS WE DISCOVERED

- Serious shortage of affordable care
- No way to assess quality of care available, except parent instinct
- AN/AI families utilize child care at same rates as non-Native families
- There are just under 5,000 AN/AI children in Anchorage 0-5 yrs.
- Parents want to spread the word about child development and to have easy access to information
- State kindergarten assessment is inconsistently implemented
- AN/AI children have the highest rates of ear infections in the country

RESULTS:

- CITC opens Early Head Start offering day long, year round care for 70 Alaska Native children ages 0-3 with Yup'ik immersion classrooms & MIECHEV home visiting program.
- ASD kindergarten teachers are trained on ADP implementation and Alaska Native & American Indian cultures.
- ARISE parents & partners launch coordinated social media campaign to "get the word out" about early learning and child development.
