
Provide:

Rural Engagement



Issues

- Overcentralized emergency response capability
- Increasing trans-Arctic vessel traffic and foreign military operations
- Need for US military Arctic Operational Expertise

Solutions

- Expand the Alaska National Guard's rural presence
 - Dictated by federal authorities
 - Requires significant lead time
- Expand the Alaska State Defense Force (ASDF)
 - Partner with rural leaders to help grow engagement off the road system
 - Bridge the gap to Guard expansion
 - Requires GF funds
 - Expand by a scout battalion within 3-5 years
 - 81-member headquarters (Bethel)
 - 3 X 77-person companies of 4 or 5 member Scout teams
 - Requested funding will form and equip initial force:
 - headquarters (Bethel)
 - three company of Scouts (Quinahagak, Kipnuk, Kwethluk, Hooper Bay)



Village Relocation



Issues

- Community decision to relocate or to stay in place
- No specific agency responsible for village relocation
 - DMVA part of the solution:
 - Mitigation program funding (limited)
 - Military Engineering Training opportunities Innovative Readiness Training (limited)
 - Team with DCCED/DCRA, HUD, BIA Denali Commission
- Huge costs (estimated \$100M-\$150M per community) to re-locate
- Long process (Newtok Project over 10 years in the planning)

Solutions

- Collaborative Planning:
 - Whole of Community
 - State and Federal Agencies
 - Native Corporations
 - Non-Governmental Agencies (NGA)
- Collaborative Resourcing




Organizational Chart

Total Force: approximately 3,854 uniformed members and 272 non-uniformed employees





FY2016 Successes

- Delivered 9M+ Gallons fuel, 150K+ tons cargo (state-side and deployed), mishap-free
- Provided ANG augmentation to 300-acre Moose Creek Wildfire—3 hour response time!
- Executed new long range Arctic Search and Rescue capabilities—improved survivability
- Alaska Rescue Coordination Center executed 5,418th mission—51 lives saved this year

FY2017 Operations

- Transition of C-17 airframes from Active Duty to Air National Guard
- Leading Air Reserve Component in legacy HC-130H to new HC-130J model conversion
- Increase innovative approaches to state-wide recruiting challenges

FY2018 Outlook

- Future mission plan for increased tanker requirements at Eielson AFB
- Recruiting difficulties due to continued increase in demand for commercial pilots
- Refining Arctic Sustainment Package



FY2016 Successes

- Army Aviation augmented McHugh Creek fire
 - Fire containment coordination with the State Division of Forestry
- Conducted Defense Support of Civil Authorities (DSCA) training in Utqiagvik in coordination with other State agencies
- Completed NORTHCOM-sponsored (Joint Chiefs of Staff Exercise-Related) Construction Program
 - Joint use Utqiagvik barracks project increases Arctic training capacity and force projection

FY2017 Operations

- Increase recruiting in rural Alaskan communities
- Sustain Fort Greely Ground-based Midcourse Defense (GMD) Fire Control System
- Develop future force structure opportunities for all Alaskans

FY2018 Outlook

- State budget issues (state match of federal funds) may affect construction and maintenance of National Guard facilities
- Federal funding challenges for travel in Alaska may affect National Guard membership in rural communities

- 62 full time budgeted positions
- \$9,498.3 total budget request (\$2,460.7 UGF)

- Build long-term relationships with both our partners and our customers


















FY2016 Successes

- Fall Preparedness Conference: 220 attendees w/ major Homeland Security theme focus
- Alaska Shield 2016: First major statewide full-scale HS exercise in nine years
- Safeguarded homes/infrastructure in four flood-prone communities by leveraging federal Pre-Disaster Mitigation funds

FY2017 Operations

- Rural Engagement Initiative: Conducting two Rural Resilience Workshops in regional hub communities
- Training/outreach effort to Southeast Alaska with our state-of-the-art earthquake simulator

FY2018 Outlook

- Community planning including Small Community Emergency Response, evacuation, and local hazard mitigation for communities that don't meet eligibility requirements for federal funding
- Continue partnerships with ANSCA Regional Non-Profit corporations
- Participate in a cooperating technical partnership to undertake risk, hazard, and vulnerability assessments

- Participated in Alaska Shield 2016, Vigilant Shield 2016 and United Resolve 2016
- Established a signal detachment in Bethel
- Conducted exploratory meetings with Alaska Native Veterans Organization regarding mutual support efforts

FY2017 Operations

- Rural Engagement Initiative: Establish Scout detachments in Quinahagak, Hooper Bay, Kwethluk, Kipnuk, Kodiak
- Participate in Arctic Eagle/Arctic Edge 2017
- Participate in ground search and rescue training
- Conduct planning for participation in rural community supported events statewide
- Develop funding through continued partnerships with state, corporate, and private entities

FY2018 Outlook

- Increase growth in rural communities to include Kotzebue, Nome and Utquiagvik (Barrow)
- Procure equipment, conduct training, leadership development and exercise
- Continue partnerships with state, corporate, and private entities



Office of Veterans Affairs



Mission: Advocate for Alaska's transitioning military and veterans/families through claims for education, medical services, compensation and pension, obtaining earned/lost military awards, discharge upgrades, burials, and all benefits earned through service

- 4 full time budgeted positions
- 17 Veterans Service Officers (grantees)
- \$2,054.0 total budget request (\$1,792.6 UGF)

FY2016 Successes

- Assisted 62K+ seeking assistance w/ Fed & State Benefits/Claims
 - Returned \$105M+ in payments owed to Vets/family members
 - \$247M in disability compensation/pension
 - \$254M in managed health care costs
 - \$1.1B in guaranteed home loans and \$72M in education benefits
- Awarded \$250K VA Highly Rural Transportation grant—our third year!

FY2017 Operations

- Fully implement the Veterans Information System (VIS)
- Continue partnerships with key stakeholders to ensure veterans receive earned benefits/services
- Ensure equality to all Veterans who receive VA benefits and services

FY2018 Outlook

- Travel restrictions may hamper outreach to our most-remote veterans
- High demand for services stressing resources and program successes
- Upcoming VA transition may affect current partnerships/agreements with Alaska



Alaska Military Youth Academy



Mission: Instill life coping skills in and meet educational needs of 16-18 year old Alaskans who are at risk of not completing their secondary education

- 66 full and 2 part time budgeted positions
- \$8,735.8 total budget request (\$4,567.1 UGF)

FY2016 Successes

- Launched Construction Trades, Culinary Arts, and Computer Technology preapprenticeship programs
- Established AMYA as a certified WorkKeys satellite test center for cadets
- Added Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) to AMYA curriculum

FY2017 Operations

- Enhancing career awareness instruction in remodeled VoTech Lab
- Added Health Care Services Pre-apprenticeship Training
- Added Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training

FY2018 Outlook

- Expand CERT training opportunities for more cadets
- Continue to build partnership for greater success of cadet placement
- Maintain adequate staffing to remain in compliance with the federal cooperative agreement



Division of Administrative Services

Alaska Aerospace Corporation



- Alaska Aerospace Corporation (AAC) was created in 1991 as a public corporation of the state
- AAC is located for administrative purposes within the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs, but with a separate and independent legal existence
- AAC is an independent corporation under a nine-person board of directors, appointed by the Governor
- Senator Gary Stevens (R-Kodiak) and Representative Louise Stutes (R-Kodiak) serve as legislative ex officio members of the board
- AAC owns and operates the Pacific Spaceport Complex Alaska (PSCA), located on 3,700 acres of state-owned land about 40 miles south of Kodiak
 - PSCA provides responsive, efficient launch capability for polar, sun-synchronous, and high inclination orbits to both government and commercial customers
 - Kodiak Island was selected because of its ideal and unobstructed access to the southern sky and its low risk to public safety
- AAC generated \$382.8 million in revenue, of which the State of Alaska has provided \$58.7 million in state capital and operating funds, accounting for 16% of total revenues





Alaska Aerospace Corporation



FY2016 Successes:

- Completed reconstruction of damaged PSCA facilities from 2014 launch failure
- Signed \$80.4 million multi-year contract with Missile Defense Agency (MDA)
- Signed \$2.2 million launch services contract with Rocket Lab USA for supporting test and development launches of the Electron rocket from Mahia Peninsula, New Zealand
- Rocket Lab USA designated the PSCA as their US polar launch site
- Signed contract with Vector Space Systems for planning and programming of future PSCA launches
- Signed a Letter of Commitment with a third commercial aerospace company to support launches from PSCA in late 2017
- Using a Department of Defense appropriation, AAC invested \$2.6 million in upgrades to PSCA capabilities designed to enhance the ability to costeffectively support future US government and commercial launches
- Ended 2016 with an end-of- year net position of \$76.3 million, an increase of seven percent (\$4.9 million) over 2015

FY2017 Operations:


- Support up to eight Rocket Lab USA Electron launches from the Mahia Peninsula, New Zealand launch facility
- Support Vector Space Systems with first test launch from PSCA in early 2017
- Support MDA first THAAD launches from PSCA in early summer 2017
- Support MDA planning and programming for second THAAD launches in 2018 from PSCA
- Secure a \$4.5 million FY 2017 federal appropriation for infrastructure improvements at PSCA
- Secure an additional \$4.5 million FY 2018 federal appropriation for infrastructure enhancements at PSCA
- Develop liquid-fuel launch infrastructure capabilities for small and ultra-small launch vehicle operations at PSCA
- Establish Aurora Launch Services, LLC, a wholly owned AAC company, to provide low-cost commercial launch services worldwide
