






### Alaska State Libraries, Archives and Museums Library Operations

Statutes: AS 14.56; AS 24.05.135; AS 40.21; AS 40.25.115(e); AS 44.27.020

Regulations: 4 AAC 59; 2 AAC 96.200(c)

Contribution to Department's Mission:

Provides access to information, trains school and public librarians, and preserves the history of the state.

FY2020 Governor's Budget (changes from FY2019 Management Plan):

- Fund source switch from Alaska Higher Education Investment Fund to the General Fund
- (\$1,093.9) UGF decrement to reduce the School Broadband Access Grants (School BAG) program to align budget with anticipated expenditures
- (\$13.7) (\$6.9 UGF; \$0.4 DGF; \$6.4 Fed) decrement for the Executive Branch 50% travel reduction

#### FY2020 Budgeted Positions:

• 25 permanent full-time (PFT) and 1 non-perm

#### **Information Services**

- Provides library and reference service to state government;
- Serves as a depository for state and federal publications concerning Alaska;
- Offers consulting services on technical topics to Alaskan libraries, archives and museums;
- Coordinates the Talking Book Center to provide audiobooks and the official election pamphlets for Alaskans with visual disabilities; and
- Coordinates statewide library projects such as SLED (Statewide Library Electronic Doorway)
- Participates in the Alaska Library Catalog, a nearly statewide library catalog with 260,000 active library users, 3 million titles, and 3.6 million checkouts
- Participates in the Alaska Digital Library, with 18,000 active users downloading 442,000 e-books and audiobooks annually
- In conjunction with OMB and other agencies, develops the initial project of Government as a Platform (GaaP). The Data Hub will provide better, more appropriate, and streamlined access to State of Alaska data to agencies, researchers, business, and the general public. As the first GaaP project, Information Services is developing many of the governance, procedural, and technical systems that will serve GaaP as it expands.

#### **FY2018 Information Services Statistics**

- Answered (with the Historical Collections) 28,023 reference questions from state employees, library staff statewide, researchers and the public;
- 739 Alaskans with visual or physical disabilities checked out or downloaded 25,988 audiobooks and magazines, an average of 35 items per person;



- A total of 18,373 Alaskans downloaded 442,277 audiobooks and e-books from the Alaska Digital Library, an average of 1,212 items per day
- On the SLED databases which cost \$698.0, Alaskans did 212M searches for information and downloaded 309,886 full-text articles concerning languages, science, social science, English, arts & music, health, engineering & technology, and math. At a retail cost of \$14 per article, this could have cost Alaskans \$4,338,404.

#### **Historical Collections**

- Contains over 90,000 Alaskan books and serials, microfilmed newspapers from 120 Alaska communities; more than 500,000 photographs; and manuscript collections comprised of personal papers, private diaries and correspondence of a wide variety of Alaskans;
- Continues to digitize images to add to the 20,000 Alaskana photographs on Alaska's Digital Archives at: http://vilda.alaska.edu/cdm/index
- Continues to post sound recordings, videocassettes, and films on the Historical Collection's YouTube channel;
- Participates in the Library of Congress' National Digital Newspaper Project to digitize and make searchable online early Alaskan newspapers. Over 103,000 pages of pre-1923 newspapers have already been digitized and more are in the works;
- Builds relationships with potential donors to continue adding historical materials to the collections; and
- Provides in-depth research assistance and photo duplication services to students and teachers, government employees, genealogists, academic researchers, and authors and publishers.

#### **FY2018 Historical Collections Statistics**

- Answered (with the Information Services) 28,023 reference questions from state employees, library staff statewide, researchers and the public;
- Added 527 Alaska State publications in paper to the collections;
- As more agencies are making their publications available only in electronic format, Information Services is collecting these publication through Archive-It and in-house severs;
- Filled 262 requests for 865 high quality photo images.

# **Library Development**

- Provides consulting services to public and school libraries;
- Consults on special topics, such as library grants and statistics, library technology and E-Rate, and summer reading programs and early literacy;
- Supports the Alaska Library Network, which manages the Alaska Digital Library for e-books and audiobooks;
- Provides continuing education (CE) for library staff; and
- Manages a wide range of statewide library services to Alaskans, including books by mail, talking book services, SLED's statewide databases, the Alaska Library Network, and the Ready to Read Resource Center.



### **FY2018 Library Development Statistics**

- Awarded 195 grants totaling \$1,956,744 to 81 libraries and library organizations statewide;
- Answered 2,905 reference questions;
- Made 31 site visits to libraries;
- Offered 87 training workshops, seminars and webinars; and
- Trained 3,201 library staff during these events.

# **E-Rate**


#### E-Rate consultant:

- Provides support to all of Alaska's 54 public school districts, 6 private schools, 1 state-run school, and 2 education service agencies to obtain E-Rate funding;
- Provides support to 73 public libraries to obtain E-Rate funding;
- Evaluates and verifies School BAG applications; and
- Represents Alaska's needs at national meetings concerning this complex funding program.

### **School Broadband Assistance Grants (School BAG)**

 Library Development cooperates with the E-Rate consultant to solicit and review School BAG grant applications, process grant awards, solicit grant reports, and request refunds of unspent School BAG money.

#### FY2020 Governor's Budget decrement in School BAG funding:

- The FY2020 Governor's Amended Budget contains a decrement of \$1,093.9 DGF to the School BAG program to align budget with anticipated expenditures.
- The cost of internet in some rural districts is decreasing, so some districts are no longer eligible for School BAG funding because their annual internet costs have fallen below the November 2014 benchmark established by state law (AS 14.03.127).
- Some districts are now able to get more than 10 mbps at a price close to what they were paying in November 2014, so they are choosing to forego School BAG funds in favor of getting more than 10 mbps for their schools. E-Rate still pays the lion's share of their internet costs, so the districts are able to absorb the increased cost of many more mbps without School BAG funds. Their internet needs and the lower cost for internet and E-Rate support have allowed some districts to go beyond the 10 mbps limit of the School BAG program.

# Alaska State Libraries, Archives and Museums Archives Operations

Statutes: AS 40.21

Regulations: 4 AAC 59.005-070

#### Contribution to Department's Mission:

Provides access to information, preserves the history of the state, and promotes the development of archives statewide.

FY2020 Governor's Budget (changes from FY2019 Management Plan):

• (\$0.5) Fed decrement for the Executive Branch 50% travel reduction

#### FY2020 Budgeted Positions:

• 10 permanent full-time (PFT)

### **State Archives**

- Contains original records of the Alaska Legislature from 1912 to the present day, the Executive branch from 1884, and the Judicial branch's records to Statehood. (The Archives assists the Alaska Court System in management of its post-Statehood records.)
- Answers reference questions concerning the records of the Territory and State;
- The records management unit and the imaging and microfilm unit save state agencies money by maintaining records in lower cost storage spaces and by filming records onto smaller formats for long-term use;
- Microfilms Alaska's daily newspapers for long term preservation and provides copies of these newspapers to Alaskan libraries; and
- Consults and provides training to municipal and tribal governments.

#### **FY2018 Archives Statistics**

- The State Archives holds 39,533 containers of material, the largest and most valuable collection of legal and government records in Alaska;
- Answered 373 reference questions;
- Trained 28 government employees on archival processes; and
- Added 624 cubic foot boxes of permanent state agency documents to the Archives.



# Alaska State Libraries, Archives and Museums Museum Operations

Statutes: AS 14.57 Regulations: 4 AAC 58

#### Contribution to Department's Mission:

Provides access to information, preserves the history of the state, and promotes the development of museums statewide.

#### FY2020 Governor's Budget (changes from FY2019 Management Plan):

• (\$3.0) (\$0.4 UGF; \$2.6 DGF) decrement for the Executive Branch 50% travel reduction

#### FY2020 Budgeted Positions:

• 13 permanent full-time (PFT) and 3 permanent part-time (PPT)

#### Governor's Directives: Improved Services and Reduced Costs

"Property Disposal: The State of Alaska owns or has management responsibility for numerous facilities and properties. It currently has over 1,800 structures on its property inventory, totaling 16 million square feet of space, with a booked property value of  $\sim$  \$7 billion. Agencies will investigate options available for reducing the State's assets by identifying properties that could be sold, or sold and then leased by the State, in order to realize short and long-term cost savings." Per this directive, the Division will look to sell or transfer two properties in Sitka: the Stratton Building and the Sheldon Jackson Museum.

## The Alaska State Museum (ASM) and the Sheldon Jack Museum (SJM)

- Identify, collect, preserve and exhibit Alaska's historical and natural history;
- Provide public access to services and collections of the Museums;
- Loans objects from its collections to museums for their exhibits;
- Develop traveling exhibits for shipment to museums around the state;
- Offer educational support programs, such as the Hands-On Loan Program which loans materials to schools for curriculum support;
- Provides a searchable online database of the 38,000 objects at the State Museum and the 6,000 objects at the Sheldon Jackson Museum;
- Assists and advises in the growth and development of other museums within Alaska with grants-in-aid awards and on-site assessment visits to consult on aspects of museum operations; and
- Provides training for museum staff statewide through a quarterly bulletin, online museum chats on different topics, and various training workshops.



#### **FY2018 Museum Statistics**

- Answered 7,169 reference questions (down from 8,058);
- Held 3,541 adult and youth activity programs (down from 3,737);
- Hosted 60,952 museum visitors (up from 54,967); and
- Trained 1,073 museum employees on museum management and services (down from 1,303).
- Two museum staff spent a week in Anchorage following the earthquake, consulting with and assisting small museums in Anchorage and the MatSu as they coped with the disaster.

#### Contribution to Department's Mission:

Live Homework Help provides online tutoring services with accomplished, vetted, and monitored tutors for grades four through early college. These tutors assist Alaskan students to do well in courses, participate in statewide initiatives such as the Alaska Performance Scholarship Awards, meet goals, and prepare for post-secondary success.

- Live Homework Help provides tutoring services via Tutor.com, a national company, with accomplished, vetted, and monitored human tutors for grades four through early college. Tutors are located around the country and internationally.
- Tutors are available to students via the SLED (Statewide Library Electronic Doorway) web page http://lam.alaska.gov/sled/homework from noon to 2 am daily;
- Tutors spends an average of 20 minutes per session helping each student;
- Students and tutors use online chat and a whiteboard to review homework and can upload homework for the tutor to review;
- The student fills out an evaluation form before leaving LHH;
- Each tutoring session costs \$7.75; and
- The \$138,200 allocation pays for 17,832 sessions annually and the State Library uses federal LSTA (Library Services and Technology Act) grant funds to cover the remaining cost.

#### **LHH Statistics**

- In FY2018, 16,377 students received 6,136 hours of tutoring assistance
- In FY2017, 19,110 students received 6,978 hours of tutoring assistance.
- Since sessions are paid at a flat rate, the Division must carefully balance advertising this service so that we have enough funds to cover it. More advertising equals more usage, a double-edged sword.
- The \$138,200 allocated to LHH pays for 17,832 sessions per year.

- Houses irreplaceable collections in a secure and atmosphere controlled repository;
- Offers one-stop reference service to students, researchers and tourists under one roof;
- Makes the atrium, classroom, and lecture hall available for free public programs and private rentals:
- Provides an OWL videoconference room to staff, agencies and public for statewide meetings;
- Provides display cases on the mezzanine level;
- Houses a café and gift store to serve visitors;
- Houses a museum conservation work area and a paper work area (the only such spaces in Alaska) to stabilize and conserve museum materials of all types;
- Micrographics work area has equipment digitized microforms or physical documents as well as develop and digitize film; and
- Has signed a memorandum of agreement with KTOO to film and broadcast APK lectures and events on a statewide basis on 360 North.

#### **FY2018 APK Statistics**

 Total of 20,244 Alaskan attended both free public programs and private rental events at the APK, up from 10,745 in FY2017. The facility was used by the Alaska School Administrators Association for a reception during their legislative fly-in (270 people), the U.S. Coast Guard held a change of command ceremony (175 people), and the Division did their first annual family fun day (145 people.)

#### FY2018 – FY2019 APK Facility Operations Overview:

- Division staff opened and closed the building, armed and disarmed the intrusion system, and monitored and assisted with evening and weekend events, saving the Division about \$150.0 annually.
- Utilities cost \$410.0 in FY2017 and increased to \$449.4 in FY2018, a 9.6% increase.



- In FY2019, the Division of Risk Management increased its chargeback to the Division to \$186.2, an increase of \$109.6 (245%) over the \$76.6 the Division paid in FY2018. Risk Management added a new fine arts insurance policy to cover all the collections of the Division, estimated at a value of \$275M.
- The facility remained without dedicated maintenance staff until March 2018. Division staff hired commercial contractors for refrigeration, electrical, plumbing, and small carpentry repairs.
- As part of shared services, the Division's building manager position was transferred in FY2018 to the Department of Administration, from which it would be transferred to the Department of Transportation's Division of Facility Services in FY2019. The APK has benefitted from Division of Facility Services' care since March 2018.

Library Development worked with the early literacy program at DEED to purchase a two-year contract for Tumblebooks, which all Alaskans can access for free at: http://sled.alaska.edu. Tumblebooks offers ebooks, animated ebooks, and videos for kids in kindergarten through 6th grade, in English, Spanish, and French. (Works best with Chrome browser.)



Division staff began working through all of our web pages to make these materials accessible to people living with disabilities, a project that is taking roughly two years.



The State Archives hosted a husband and wife team for twelve months as they digitized a variety of records for addition to Family Search.
