





SFY 2018 Costs by Funding Source and Average Cost per Person by Service Type



Programs (OSEP) supports a
comprehensive array of programs and
projects authorized by the Individuals
with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)
that improve results for infants, toddlers,
children and youth with disabilities.

IDEA Part C Formula Grants support early intervention services for infants and toddlers, birth to 3 years of age, who have developmental delays and/or disabilities.

In FY2018, Infant Learning providers received 2,925 referrals. Of those, 1,572 were deemed eligible.



### **Community Based Grant Programs – Community Developmental Disabilities Grants**

Community and Developmental Disabilities Grants provide services to Individuals with Disabilities.

Grant programs include: Short Term Assistance and Referral (STAR), Deaf Navigator, Student Life Program, and the Community Developmental Disabilities Grant.

Medicaid Reform (SB74), leveraged federal funds to refinance a portion of the Community Developmental Disabilities Grants into a 1915(c) waiver: Individualized Supports Waiver.

Effective date of waiver: October 1, 2018.

Resulting in general fund savings of \$5,817.9

# Department of Health and Society

## Community Based Grant Programs – Safety Net Funding

- \$450,000.00 was set aside to provide services to Community Developmental Disabilities Grant recipients who do not meet the level of care requirement to qualify for the Individualized Supports Waiver.
- Eligibility for Safety Net Funding was amended to include services for individuals working to complete the application for the Individualized Support Waiver (don't have a support plan approved yet).
- As of March 4, 2019, 40 individuals have accessed the Safety Net Funding.



### Community Based Grant Programs – General Relief Assisted Living Home Program

Senior and Disabilities Services State of Alaska Continuum of Care Total \$7,855.6 # Served 889 State: 100% General Relief/ Temporary Assisted Living \$8,836 Avg cost/person

General Relief provides assisted living home services to eligible adults, including vulnerable adults, who require the protective oversight of an assisted living home.



### General Relief Assisted Living Home Program -Authorized Budget compared to Actual Expenditures

Requests for assistance from this program currently outpace available funding. Senior and Disabilities Services implemented a waitlist for General Relief Assisted Living Home benefits on March 1, 2019.



### **Community Based Grant Programs – Senior Community Based Grants**




Senior Community Based Grants assist seniors to live as independently as possible and help their families to provide support and care.

- Adult Day Program,
- Senior Residential Services.
- Medicare Information Office,
- Aging and Disabilities Resource Center.

### Federal Older Americans Act (Title III) Grant Programs

Between FY2011 through FY2018 grant funding has not kept up with inflation: general price inflation grew by 1.4 percent per year and healthcare price inflation grew by 3.8 percent per year.



### Medicaid State Plan Optional Services – Personal Care Services






- Personal Care Services are a State Plan option. (GF 50%/FFP 50%)
- Individuals who require assistance with Activities of Daily living (such as bathing) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living (such as shopping) are assessed and allocated time for tasks.
- Medicaid Reform (SB74) leverage enhanced federal match, through the Community First Choice Program, for personal care services and other eligible Home and Community Based Service.
- Effective October 1, 2018 eligible individuals from the Personal Care program were auto enrolled into the Community First Choice program. (GF 44%/FFP 56%)


