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



#### **Transforming the System: The 1115 Waiver Demonstration Project**

#### 1115 Waiver Approved in November 2018

- Allows federal partners to waive certain Medicaid rules
- State's proposal must be cost neutral or better.
- 1115 is a 2-3 year approval process with significant Division workload
- Once approved amendments are far easier to approve

#### Current Approval:

 More treatment beds: Residential treatment facilities with more than 16 beds cannot bill Medicaid. CMS has waived this rule for Alaska, making approximately 66 additional treatment beds available to Alaska Medicaid recipients.

#### Future Approval:

- New Services: such as mobile crisis response, 23-hour crisis stabilization services, etc.
- Child and Family benefits: Prevent those at risk for substance abuse, mental health, ACES from developing chronic and costly conditions
- Community-based services: Direct care towards less intense services in the community, not institutions
- Medication assisted treatment care coordination: MAT care coordination is a new service that will connect primary health care with behavioral health treatment
- Early screening and intervention: New screening and intervention services in emergency departments to identify people with early signs of addiction.

#### **Division of Behavioral Health: What is the impact?**

- Treating Substance Abuse and Mental Illness allows our recipients to become contributing members of society
- We want our recipients working and contributing to our economy; not in jail, not homeless, not in the ER, not on public assistance
- Every dollar invested in Substance Abuse Treatment saves \$4.00-\$7.00 elsewhere in the budget over the long run (Corrections, Public Assistance, Medicaid, AHFC Housing Vouchers, etc.)
- Cost of 1 day:
  - Substance abuse treatment at a community provider: \$116
  - Community mental health treatment: \$174
  - Jail: \$144

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## Division of Behavioral Health: Leveraging Federal Funds \$18.9 Million

#### Opioid Grants \$8.8 Million

- State Targeted Response (FY18-19)
- Medication Assisted Treatment Prescription Drug Opioid Addiction (Ends FY19)
- Prevent Prescription Drug Overdose Project Hope (FY19-21)
- State Opioid Response (FY19-20)

#### Other Grants \$10.1 Million

- Path (FY19-23): Services for mentally ill patients at risk of homelessness
- Partnership for Success (FY19-20): Substance abuse prevention activities
- Health Resources and Services Administration Annual Amount (FY19-23):
  Telehealth/rural access to psychiatric care
- SABG Block Grant: Community based substance abuse treatment and prevention
- MHBG Block Grant: Community based substance abuse treatment and prevention



## Division of Behavioral Health: Medicaid Quality Assurance Services Section

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
- The DBH Medicaid Quality Assurance Services Section provides program integrity and quality control in addition to services to specific populations through Medicaid coverage
- Currently Behavioral Health services covered by Medicaid are administered through the state plan:
  - Includes Substance Use Disorder, Rehabilitative Services, and Clinical services, for adults and children
  - Children under 21 with a diagnosis of Autism are eligible for Autism Services from enrolled Board Certified Behavioral Analysis (BCBA) agencies. These are state plan services
  - Children under 21 years of age who need a higher level of residential psychiatric care not available in the State of Alaska; many of these children have co-occurring mental health and developmental delays and need highly specialized care. DBH Medicaid staff provide a high level of oversight to ensure these youth are receiving the needed quality of care

## **Division of Behavioral Health: Prevention & Early Intervention Services**

- Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention and Early Intervention Community Coalitions
- Suicide Prevention-CareLine; Trauma-Engaged Alaska Alternative School Initiative-provide counselors in 14 alternative schools; community training
- Rural human services systems project (RHSS) is a partnership between DBH and the University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF) College of Rural Alaska
- Tobacco Compliance program works directly in communities across Alaska to reduce youth access to tobacco, e-cigarette, and vape products from retailers
- Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP) provides substance abuse screening, case management and accountability for DWI and other alcohol/drug related misdemeanor cases

#### Division of Behavioral Health: Substance Use Update (including opioids)

#### New Funding:

State Opioid Response Funds are getting disbursed to communities

## Expanding Access to treatment:

- 320 prescribers that can prescribe medication to treat addiction (Buprenorphine)
- All four (4) methadone clinics in Alaska are billing Medicaid
- Making efforts to strengthen coordination between primary care and behavioral health
- DBH established online treatment bed locator
- Expansion of withdrawal management services increased bed capacity by 15%
- FY19 appropriation of \$12 million expansion has funded crisis stabilization, withdrawal management, supported housing



#### Division of Behavioral Health: Children's Mental Health Services

- 24-hour care for vulnerable children (custody and non-custody) who are unable to remain in their own home
- Structured and therapeutic intervention for youth who present severe and complex needs
- Individual Group and Family psychotherapy
- Substance abuse, severe emotional disorders, delinquency, and other at-risk behaviors
- Three levels of 24 hour residential care up to inpatient hospital acute services



#### **Adult Serious Mental Illness**




