RE: Response to March 11, 2019 House Finance Education and Early Development

Subcommittee Meeting

This memo is provided in response to questions asked by committee members at the March 11, 2019 House Finance Education Subcommittee meeting.

1. How many loans and borrowers does the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education service?

The Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education (ACPE), as of 12-31-2018, services 45,458 loans and 19,033 borrowers.

2. How do other states fund their grant and scholarship programs?

- Twenty-eight states have state education-based loan providers, including Alaska.
- Two states do not have grant programs. Those are Georgia and New Hampshire.
- Eight states do not report any scholarships, according to the National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Administrators annual state financial aid survey.
- We quickly polled members of the National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs and were provided the following state based information.
