### **ANCSA High Level Overview**

- 44 Million Acres of Land less than 10 percent of the total land base
- \$962 Million split 12 –ways and paid out over 11 years
- Created 12 in-State Regional Corporations and a 13<sup>th</sup> region was created after to account for those living outside the State at the time of passage
- Created over 256 village corporations, many of which merged together or with their region, there are 177 that remain today



### **ANCSA High Level Overview**

- Key difference between a Regional and Village Corporation is land ownership.
- Regional Corporations typically have all sub-surface estate rights and Village Corporations have surface estate rights to the lands they received.
- Key provision of ANCSA is the 7(i)/7(j) revenue sharing provision

- Village Corporation sustainability





# **Economic Impact**

The Village Corporations are important to the Alaska Economy

Alaska Business Monthly ranks the top 49
Alaskan owned businesses every year

 In 2017, 20% of the total revenue on the list were from Alaska Native Village, and Urban Corporations \$3.7BN

 When we add the on the Regional Corporations to the list it jumps to 79%

# ANCSA Corporations - an Economic Engine

- Alaska Native Corporations Reverse the traditional economic model
- In 2017 ANCs produced a collective \$12.9 Billion in Annual Revenues
- Over ¼ of Alaska's GDP is ANC
- On average, 80 percent or more of Net Income from Alaska Native Corporations are donated back to charitable causes, both Native and Non-Native



#### We Create JOBS!!!

 68 percent of the Alaska Based jobs on the top 49er list in 2016 report were from Alaska Native Corporations

 86 percent of all the jobs created by companies on that list were Alaska Native Corporations



### Other Interesting ANC Facts

- Over ½ of the regional corporations and many of the village corporations have voted to include those born after 1971 as shareholders
- **Every region** has an educational foundation that provides scholarships and grants to their shareholders and their families, most villages have individual foundations as well
- Majority of these entities provide Elder benefits, Death and Funeral expense assistance, and business microloans to their shareholders
- We reverse the traditional Alaska Economic model



# SOME of the villages are doing well

- For the 50 Corporations we have data for, we know they are generating returns.
- 50 village corporations in Alaska generated \$3.4bn in total revenues in 2017
- Many will begin to perform much better in the coming 50 years as human capital begins to spread to the village corporations





# Advocacy

### Contaminated Lands Advocacy Items

#### • Legislative:

- Adopt mitigation clean-up credits and tax credits for clean-up activities on ANCSA lands
- Require a minimum of bi-annual agency reporting on the status of clean-up on ANCSA lands
- Provide Native contractor preference for clean-up on Native lands
- Swap undesirable ANCSA lands with unencumbered federal property
- Adequately fund the Department of Defense Native American Lands Environmental Mitigation Program



### Contaminated Lands Advocacy Items

#### Agency:

- Prioritize clean-up on ANCSA Lands.
- Provide specific training of local residents to enhance participation in future mitigation work.
- Enforce Tribal and Alaska Native Corporation consultation on activities related to environmental mitigation on ANCSA lands.
- Support concept of bi-annual report from Department of Interior on the Status of ANCSA Lands
- Provide Native Contractor Preference for clean-up on Native Lands



# **Federal Contracting**

#### Legislative and Agency:

- Protect Native 8(a) Contracting and support increased opportunities for ANC economic development
- Eliminate Section 811 of the FAR
- Eliminate the application of category management to small businesses and SBA Programs



# Energy Infrastructure Advocacy Items

#### • Legislative:

- Ensure that Alaska Native Corporations are included in investing and service opportunities for major public infrastructure projects
- Adequately fund the Office of Indian Energy (OIE);
- Establish a dedicated budget line item to ensure OIE as a stand-alone function Elevate the OIE Director to Assistant Secretary
- Provide funding for oil spill response training and prevention

#### Agency:

Ensure a \$500M carve out for Alaska for tribal loan guarantees



### **Telecommunications**

#### • Legislative:

- Ensure that ANCs are included in investing and service opportunities for major public infrastructure projects
- Appropriate a portion of funding for first-mile and middle-mile infrastructure where it is needed most
- Increase funding or keep at current levels the USDA Rural Utilities Service Program
- Increase funding for telecom infrastructure in Western Alaska to properly support increased activity in the Arctic
- Ensure \$600M in rural broadband grants includes a preference for rural communities who still rely in dial up



#### **Telecommunications**

#### Agency:

- Improved regulatory certainty in the FCC's universal service support programs
- Fewer prohibitions and siting delays, especially on Federal lands, which inhibit and increase cost of broadband deployment
- Streamlining permitting requirements will help ensure access while also providing appropriate oversight
- Need to coordinate efficiently among all federal and state programs



### 2019 State Priorities

- 1. Prioritize the cleanup of ANCSA contaminated lands State Agencies
- 2. Support the return of 14C3 ANCSA Lands from the State to Village Corporations who elect to not have a borough or municipality in their Village
- Amend the Local Boundary Commission Process to include requirements for consent from current land owners prior to forming a Borough or Municipality
- 4. Restore the State Education Tax Credit to 100 percent for at least the first \$300K
- Ensure Local content in any state-wide infrastructure (Capital) projects as well as Operations and Maintenance contracts
