Number of Members Serving on the Committee on Committees

In each legislative session since statehood, how many members have served on the Legislature's Committee on Committees in both the Senate and the House?

Since the first Alaska Legislative Session in 1959, the Legislature's Uniform Rules has stipulated that five members of each chamber should serve on the respective chamber's Committee on Committees.¹

According to our review, since statehood the Senate has always had five members on its Committee, as did the House from statehood through the 17th Legislature (1991).² However, in the 18th Legislature (1993), the House named six members to its Committee. Since that time—from the 19th Legislature (1995) through the current 30th Legislature—the House has named seven members to its Committee.³ In the House Journals, we found no indication of why the chamber began placing more than five representatives on its Committee on Committees.
