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FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2019 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

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Analysis

HB010 amends the crime of <i>Misconduct involving a controlled substance in the third degree</i> (AS 11.71.040) to include possession of any amount of IA or 2A substances if a defendant has two or more previous convictions for <i>Misconduct involving a controlled substance in the third degree</i> (AS 11.71.040) <i>or fourth degree</i> (AS 11.71.050) or similar crimes in another jurisdiction. The bill creates an alternative sentencing structure for these offenses that allows the defendant to participate in a treatment program and, if the defendant is successful, have the charge vacated.
This bill does not apply to juvenile offenders because juveniles referred to the Division of Juvenile Justice are "adjudicated for delinquent offenses", not convicted of crimes. Juveniles referred to the Division of Juvenile Justice receive services based upon their needs and risk to reoffend. Offenders receive substance abuse screenings and assessments, and when warranted, receive court ordered substance abuse treatment in the community or in a secure Division of Juvenile Justice treatment facility. The bill will have not programmatic or fiscal impact on the Division.

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
