# **Analysis**

This bill adds a new paragraph to misconduct involving a controlled substance (MICS) in the third degree that looks at certain prior MICS convictions as a condition for a conviction under this new offense paragraph. Over the last five years, there have been an average of 286 incarcerations as a result of a conviction for this offense. The department has determined that in the past instances of an offender being convicted of MICS in the fourth degree with at least two prior convictions was uncommon. The department estimates convictions under this paragraph for prior convictions of AS11.71.040(a)(12) and similar offenses in another jurisdiction will be similar to prior convictions of AS11.71.050.

The department projects that in the first year 12 offenders will be convicted of AS 11.71.040(a)(12) who would have otherwise been convicted of AS 11.71.050 resulting in a projected increase of 117.64 incarceration days for each offender. This will result in an increase in the daily prison population of 3.87 the first year with a cost of \$238.4. Starting the second year and every year thereafter, the department projects 14 offenders will be convicted of AS 11.71.040(a)(12) annually who would have otherwise been convicted of AS 11.71.050 resulting in a projected increase of 117.64 incarceration days for each offender. This will result in an increase in the daily prison population of 4.51 per year with a cost of \$277.8 each year.

This bill also adds a new section on substitution of judgement. An offender convicted of AS11.71.040(a)(12) who is otherwise qualified may substitute treatment for incarceration so long as the offender has no prior convictions for offenses against a person (AS11.41) in Alaska or another jurisdiction. The department estimates half of those convicted of AS11.71.040(a)(12) will not have a prior conviction for an offense against a person. The department projects this will result in a reduction of 2.63 inmates in the daily average prison population the first year for a savings of \$162.0. The department projects this will result in a reduction of 3.07 inmates in the daily average prison population the second year and every year thereafter for a savings of \$189.1 each year.

This bill adds AS11.71.040(a)(12) to	the list of convictions that make an offender ineligible for suspension of sentence. The	nis
