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

UA Paths to Becoming a Teacher



UA offered 19 programs leading to an initial teaching license in 2018-2019



Teacher Shortage: What We Know

- Fewer people are entering the teaching profession in the U.S.
- 3.3 million teachers in the United States (2015)
- 343,955 new to the system (2015)
- 531,340 left profession at end of year (2016)
- What level of turnover is acceptable?

Alaska College of Education

The University of Alaska responded to the need for more teachers by creating the Alaska College of Education in 2018 to coordinate UA system level activity tied to teacher preparation.



Why Make the Change?

- Each of the UA education units is small with limited capacity to do a lot more. A coordinated approach will yield improved programs for students.
- Previous efforts to align and coordinate UA education programs did not result in a lot of change.
- AKCOE will increase student success by tightening the K-12 and UA alignment.

What Does the Alaska College of Education Do?

- Prepares teachers and graduate students in education
- Coordinates UA Education budget activity
- Leads UA Education data management and analysis
- Leads recruiting for UA Education programs
- UA point of contact for:
 - Department of Education & Early Development
 - K-12 Relations with education programs and Associations
 - K-12 Policy
 - Board of Regents



Recruitment to UA for Teaching Preparation Programs

- Educators Rising
- UA Recruiter
- K-12 Partnerships
- Paraprofessionals
- Outreach to non-traditional students
- Raise the social esteem of teaching profession



UA Prepared Teachers

- Increased emphasis on using the local context to drive culturally responsive instruction
- Improved relationships with K-12 to help drive improvement efforts
- Coordination and collaboration among the UA programs
- Improved internship experience through tighter, more supportive relationship with mentor teachers



How do we know that UA prepared teachers are effective?

- Feedback from K-12 to UA EPPs is positive
- CAEP Standard 4.1- Impact on P-12 student learning and development
- Annual survey of Principals- questions on effectiveness of newly prepared (UA) teachers- shows good preparation
- Anecdotes-qualitative hiring information



Retention Comes before Recruitment

District	% of teachers not tenured
Lower Yukon	60
Northwest Arctic	50
Lower Kuskokwim	42
Kenai	25
Anchorage	21



UA's Support for Retaining K-12 Teachers

- Retaining teachers is a must cost of hiring and training new teachers is high
- UA supports the Alaska Statewide Mentoring Project –
 working with 158 early career teachers in 21 districts
- UA supports professional development for teachers



Preparing Teachers to Work with Struggling Readers

- UA pre-service teachers are taught how to assess readers to determine the source of specific struggles and to respond instructionally
- UA pre-service teachers take special education courses that address specific learning challenges (e.g., dyslexia)
- UA pre-service teachers are taught strategies for supporting struggling readers, based on assessments
- UA education reading courses have been analyzed and augmented as result of House Bill 64 (CH. 52 SLA 2018) and conversations with stakeholders about the increasing needs in the State

UA Responding to Stakeholder Input on Reading

- The UA teacher education programs pursue data-driven continuous improvement that includes substantive stakeholder input about the needs of Alaska's children.
- In the area of reading instruction, education faculty from UAA, UAF, and UAS are working in collaboration to strengthen literacy and special education courses in response to the needs of Alaska's children, stakeholder input and Alaska State Legislative action such as HB 64: Legislative Task Force on Reading Proficiency & Dyslexia

Trauma Informed Instruction

- By age 6, 27% of Alaska's children have experienced at least two adverse childhood experiences.
- Teachers report that it is now more common to have multiple children in a class who are demonstrating effects of ACEs
- UA's Teacher Prep Programs include an understanding of ACEs and stress that the basis of working with children affected by ACEs is the teacher's relationship with the child.
- UA's pre-service teachers are taught to build respectful relationships with children throughout their program
- It is common for K-12 to approach trauma informed instruction through a district or whole school approach. Hired teachers are then trained in the adopted approach or program

UA Teacher Prep Going Forward

- UA Board of Regents voted on April 8 to discontinue the 7 UAA initial licensure programs. UAF and UAS are now the 2 UA units to offer initial licensure programs
- UAF and UAS are responsible for offering these programs to Anchorage area students
- UAA will maintain its advanced programs
- Alaska College of Education is charged with coordinating the transition that will be on-going for the next two years
