UPDATE ON MEDICAID REFORM & IMPACT ON BEHAVIORAL HEALTH • Senate Bill 74 was signed into law in 2016.

• The bill contained many behavioral health system reforms.

- Authorization for the state to pursue an 1115 Medicaid waiver with CMS to improve access to earlier intervention and community recovery support.
  - Substance Abuse Waiver services started July 2019
  - Mental Health Waiver services have not started yet
- Authorization to contract with an Administrative Services Organization (ASO) to manage the behavioral health system of care

- ASO scheduled to launch next month

SUCCESS OF REFORM EFFORTS DEPENDS ON...

- Predictable, sustainable operational funding and programs and policies
  - It's difficult to plan with added uncertainty
- ✓ Start-up capital to fund the system changes
  - Everything from work that needs to be done with updates to our billing systems and medical records for better care and required quality data reporting to transforming our outreach and clinical delivery
  - We are anticipating some guidance with the Division of Behavioral Health's soon to be released Gap Analysis
