• For the stipend program rate chart on slide 14 – what is the "base"? How are the monthly/daily rates derived?

The increases are calculated using the Consumer Price Index (CPI), which is maintained and calculated by the Department of Labor's Research and Analysis Section. A copy of that is attached for reference, see document titled: *Consumer Price Index.pdf*. The stipend program rate calculation is noted in 4 AAC 09.050(7).

From the stipend program regarding payment rates:

Payment rates for food and housing used the following survey data. Food costs were adjusted using December 1987 University of Alaska Cooperative Extension service survey data. Housing costs were updated using the State of Alaska, Department of Administration's Alaska Geographic Differential Study survey data on an urban family budget for Anchorage in April 1985, then adjusting costs from the CPI's to 1988, then determining the proportional cost of housing per person. School districts were grouped by region considering climatic and transportation characteristic, relating them to the communities for which cost-of-living data was available. The stipend rates remained unchanged until FY1999 when the department started to adjust the stipend rates by the CPI for Anchorage.

- For Galena, what is the cost difference between the residential vs. stipend programs? Galena has not participated in the stipend program since FY2006. If they had eligible students in FY2020 for the stipend program, it would be \$801 per month, and their residential program is \$1,776 per month. Residential rates are set in statute AS 14.16.200 and the stipend program rate calculation is noted in 4 AAC 09.050(7).

• **Provide the two new proposed residential program applications and budgets** The application and budgets for the North Slope Borough School District and Lower Yukon School District are attached as requested. See documents titled: *North Slope Residential Learning Center Application.pdf* and *LYSD Residential Application.pdf*. • Provide details about the "standards of care" for students DEED references/holds districts to when evaluating applications

The application requests information on the school's plan for students in crisis-prevention, intervention, and follow-up. Other than that, and generic information requests, DEED does not have specific "standards of care", as the persons hired to staff the residential facilities are school district employees and go through the same background checks that all other district employees must complete. The residential school programs are only available to students in the ninth through the twelfth grades. The residential schools also provide councilors for the students in case the student has trouble adjusting to being away from home. Districts also have policies in place to monitor the students in the program and if the student is not adjusting or is having behavioral problems the student will be sent home before the end of the program term.

Additionally, as a side note, references were made in the meeting to the issues with the State/BIA run boarding schools that were closed in the 1970's and how they were very damaging to the students and what standards of care are in place with these programs. The old boarding schools included elementary aged students and the students did not have the option to return home which caused many problems for the young students. Those programs were run in an age when counseling services were not provided so the care of the students was lacking. The modern residential schools are limited to just 9-12 grades to minimize the separation issues and the student always has the option to return home and attend the school in their community if the student or district decides it is necessary.

- Provide the history of TVEP districts selected that ended up in statute Funding for this program is run through the Department of Labor and Workforce Development (DOLWD). DOLWD would need to be contacted to determine why other technical or vocational residential schools are not receiving any of these funds.
- Is there any postsecondary data available on our residential programs? DEED does not collect postsecondary data on the residential programs.
