












ALASKA **OIL AND GAS WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT PLAN**







A Ten Year Analysis – UAA ISER Center for Alaska Policy Research

- Enrollments have increased by 85% since 2008
- Headcount has grown by 49%
- Significant growth among traditional underserved populations
- 93% completion rate
- 3.37 average statewide GPA

Technical Vocational Education Program (TVEP)






- Program sunsets June 2020
- Administered by Alaska Workforce Investment Board (AWIB)
- Funds high-demand training and education that lead to jobs
- Funded through payroll deductions ~\$12.4M in FY20
- UA receives 45% of the program dollars ~\$5.6M in FY20




UA FY19 TVEP ~\$4.9M Funding Distribution

UAA Aviation Maintenance Technology Graduate Sarah Snell


