Opening Statement for Legislative Confirmation hearing Catherine Fritz, AELS Board February 2020

Thank you for this opportunity to speak with you today, and for your consideration of my reappointment to the AELS Board for a second term.

I have lived in Alaska since 1983 and have been a registered architect since 1990. I recently welcomed a young family to Juneau who has relocated here to accept a job and begin their Alaskan life adventure. It reminded me of my own arrival and start of my career. There was both excitement and apprehension that Spring day that I got off the plane. In the weeks that followed, the apprehension quickly faded, while the excitement deepened into an indomitable appreciation for the natural beauty that surrounded me, and the community that embraced me.
