

## Adult Public Assistance

- State Plan Amendment (SPA) submission required by the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare (CMS) –Optional State Supplemental Beneficiaries (42 CFR 435.232 and 435.234)
- Required to come into compliance effective January 1, 2020
  - "payments are equal to the difference between the income standard and an individual's countable income".
  - Alaska committed to lowering the income standard for the eligibility group to reflect the maximum payment levels in order to become compliant.

# Backlog

- Timely processing of applications through:
  - Reorganization of teams to match workflow needs
  - Improvements to hiring and training
  - Implementation of data quality reviews and continuous improvement
- Decrease in the number of constituent complaints to the legislature and the Governor's Office
- Meeting Federal timeliness standards
  - SNAP 96%
  - Medicaid 86.7%



# Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Rule Change

- Food Nutrition Services (FNS) final rule change effective December 5, 2019 implementing rule changes regarding waivers for Able Bodied Adults Without Dependents (ABAWD)
- State's have two options for requesting waivers to exempt certain areas of the state:
  - Option 1 exempts Labor Market Areas with a recent 24 month average unemployment rate 20 percent or more above the national rate and at least 6 percent unemployment.

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• Option 2 exempts Labor Market Areas with a recent 12 month average unemployment rate over 10 percent.
