
Child Protection

- In FY20, the average caseload per attorney was 60 to 95 cases. Variables include location and severity.
- Attorneys have been conducting virtual hearings using a secure Zoom license since November 2020.
- COVID-19 created a significant backlog of cases because of trial suspension.
- The section expects to see an increase in cases over the next year.

Criminal Division The Duty of a Prosecutor

• The primary duty of a lawyer engaged in public prosecution is not to convict, but to see that justice is done.

-Canons of professional ethics: Canon 5. American Bar Association (1908).


 The prosecutor may prosecute with earnestness and vigor – indeed he should do so. But, while he may strike hard blows, he is not at liberty to strike foul ones. It is as much his duty to refrain from improper methods calculated to produce a wrongful conviction as it is to use every legitimate means to bring about a just one.

-Justice George Southerland, Berger v. United States, 295 U.S. 78, 88 (1935).




It is the duty and obligation of the District Attorney to ensure that every citizen's constitutional rights are safeguarded at every step of the criminal prosecution.


State Fiscal Preservation

Examples of FY2020 Revenue Generation and Protection

- <u>Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU)</u>: MFCU is 75% federally funded with 25% state match required. The GF Match portion of the FY20 MFCU budget was \$511,678. MFCU recouped actual payments of \$1,904,014, out of a total judgment recovery of \$3,455,157 for FY20.
- <u>Human Services</u>: Inclusive of audits, subrogation, annuities, and estates, the section's work resulted in \$3,571,016 funds recovered for the state.
- <u>Natural Resources/Oil & Gas</u>: The Natural Resources oil and gas work resulted in over \$275 million in tax, royalty, and attorneys' fees for the state. The section also secured a \$1.625 million settlement in the course of litigation related to a wildfire.
- <u>Transportation</u>: Collected \$943,000 from an insurer arising from damage to a state highway overpass in the Anchorage area.

COVID-19 Impacts on Department of Law Operations

Major Operational Impacts

- <u>Telework</u>: Law had infrastructure in place that supported a quick transition to telework for department staff. This allowed Law to prioritize public health and safety while maintaining the mission of the department.
- <u>Criminal Proceedings</u>: The implementation of video conferencing by the courts has allowed many hearings to continue, but there will be a significant backlog of trial work once the courts have reopened.
- <u>Civil Agency Services</u>: Client agencies required immediate and robust legal advice, which necessitated a significant pivot from standard agency activity to appropriate guidance for continuing operations in a developing pandemic.

COVID-19 Impacts on Department of Law Operations

Notable COVID-19 CARES Act Expenditures

• FY20 Personal Services: \$1,316.1

- The dynamic and rapidly changing circumstances of the pandemic necessitated redirecting workforce focus and service delivery in a substantially different manner. Some personnel required the use of COVID-19-specific leave.
- Law provides estimates of personnel time spent addressing COVID-19 issues for staff across all divisions as part of the coordinated monthly report to the legislature. Civil's timekeeping system provides detailed reporting that allows for reimbursement of personal services associated with substantial COVID-19 work.

• FY21 IT – Citrix Expansion: \$136.9

• The virtual network environment already in use by the department allowed for an expedient shift to telework. Sustained telework for a majority of personnel required additional infrastructure to maintain stable and consistent access.
