### Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education

1) Provide a chart of the number of students and the dollar amount of the Alaska Performance Scholarship.

As set out in AS 14.43.840, every year the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education (ACPE), prepares and issues an Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) Outcomes Report. The report provides information relative to the number of applicants, categories of scholarships awarded, the dollar amount of scholarships awarded, and data regarding high school and postsecondary student performance and characteristics. The APS Outcomes report also provides information on eligibility and usage of career and technical education (CTE) and academic awards. Below is a table that provides a summary of the number of CTE students eligible for the APS along with the amount of recipients. Please note that due to the suspension of testing requirements for the class of 2020, there is no distinction between CTE and academic eligibility for the class of 2020-2021. The reports, going back to 2012, can be found on ACPE's website at <u>https://acpe.alaska.gov/reports</u>. In the history of the program, APS awards for eligible students have not exceeded the FY2022 requested \$11,750,000 appropriation.

We are excited to share this resource with the Committee and look forward to working with Alaska's education stakeholders, along with business and industry groups, to enhance the APS program in connection with the needs of Alaska's students and workforce. ### Alaska State Council on the Arts

### 1) Why the increase of other/receipts authority from FY2019 to FY2020?

Compared to FY2019, the increase to the FY2020 other/receipts authority was added by an amendment in the House Education Subcommittee during review of the FY2020 Governor's Budget.

The increase was in anticipation of additional funds from private foundation Margaret A Cargill Philanthropies (MACP). With ongoing transformation in the UA system of pre-service teacher training, ASCA's closure, and continuing development of the MACP's approach to support for teachers, MACP declined to continue forward with plans to expand a second site to support teacher recruitment, retention, and professional development in and through arts and cultures in Anchorage and Lake and Peninsula School District. The original site—The Munartet Project--is now its sixth year operating as a partnership between the Alaska State Council on the Arts, Kodiak Island Borough School District, Alutiiq Museum, and Kodiak Arts Council with the goal of increasing teacher confidence and competence to teach in and through arts and cultures in Kodiak.
