On April 2, 2021, Northern Region experienced an unprecedented winter event that the National Weather Service

reports set a new record for the most snow fall in a single event during the month of April and is the second-highest snow fall event on record for the area. This event resulted in 12-22 inches of snowfall within approximately 48 hours, followed by unseasonably high winds. This caused extreme drifting, avalanches, closed several roadways, and put many of DOT&PF's roadways in a very difficult or hazardous driving condition. The temperatures at the time of the event hovered around 32 degrees, making the snow composition high in moisture content.

Following the heavy snowfall and high winds, temperatures dropped significantly within 24 hours to well below zero, freezing much of the remaining snow and ice to the roadways. This caused additional safety concerns for the traveling public and made it incredibly difficult to remove. In order to promptly respond to this event, address roadway safety, and return the infrastructure to pre-storm condition (including protecting infrastructure from damage during spring thaw), the region was required to leverage additional resources (materials, overtime, and contractor services).

Revised Statute 2477 (FY22-24)**

Advancing State's Rights in navigability and RS2477 (Revised Statute 2477) is focused on maximizing Alaskans' access to, and use of, the lands and natural resources of our state. This strategy/initiative will advance state sovereignty by advocating for and protection of the rights the State acquired at statehood, review of federal land use plans and rulemaking to ensure State projects and access to our resources remain on track.

Division of Mining, Land & Water (DMLW) intends to accomplish this strategy/initiative of managing uplands, developing resources and increasing Alaskans ownership of land consistent with the unique federal and state laws by focusing on:

- Filing additional Recordable Disclaimer of Interest (RDI) applications for navigable waters with the Department of Interior to highlight how significant their backlog and delay of these actions has been. These will target high profile navigable waterways crossed by the A2A Rail (Alaska-Alberta) project and along the Ambler road route, for example.
- Engaging with the Delegation to request a prioritization of significant resources ostensibly allocated to these purposes in the federal budget, of which the State has seen no results.
- Litigation in both new and ongoing matters, where the State can continue to push to expand the existing legal precedents confirming state ownership of submerged lands.
- Undertaking an effort to require and secure state permits for federal activities on submerged waters, confirming State ownership.
- Providing comprehensive and detailed information to the public about the status of navigable waters (public service announcements, online maps, etc.), and how to work with the State to secure their access rights.
- Participating in federal land planning processes and conducting state land planning processes to assert and describe state management intent for submerged waters.

In order to accomplish these goals, DMLW will need three full-time positions, their focus will be:

- Provide for more aggressive field work and data gathering, assertion of management rights by undertaking efforts to require and secure state permits for federal actions, documentation of state-owned waterbodies and support the increased workload for advancing state's rights via navigability and RS 2477 work within the department.
- Provide support and subject matter expertise to the Program Support Section by assisting with federal rulemaking and plan revisions, federal coordinated reviews, a single point of contact on behalf of all 16 sections of the Division for large project coordination in the Office of Project Management and Permitting (OPMP), regulation packages, training, and support to the entire division.
- Provide support the increased workload in advancing State's rights for navigability and RS 2477 work within the department. The Public Access Assertion and Defense Unit (PAAD) has maintained a reoccurring Reimbursable Service Agreement (RSA) with the Office of History & Archaeology (OHA) for Historian work on these issues. Attaining this position on the PAAD Unit Team will be a more effective approach in managing staff working on RS 2477 matters and preserving public access to lands and resources and enable the State to meet its constitutional mandate to make its resources "available for maximum use consistent with the public interest."
- In addition to personal services costs, contractual costs will be necessary for navigability and RS2477 field work, data gathering, assertion of management rights, documenting state-owned waterbodies and RS2477 trails, and a more extensive use of 3rd party technical and legal experts to successfully secure federal court rulings and
