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# <u>Department of Law, Criminal Division, Recruitment and Retention:</u> <u>Rural Housing for Prosecutors Overview</u>

**<u>Problem</u>**: The Criminal Division has struggled to *keep and attract* experienced prosecutors – or even new or inexperienced prosecutors.

- ➤ Overall, the Criminal Division has had a <u>25% 37%</u> turnover rate for prosecutors per year between 2018-2020.
- ➤ Turnover is most pronounced in rural Alaska
  - Bethel has averaged <u>45% turnover</u> of prosecutors over last 7 years.

## Housing plays a critical role in this problem.

- ➤ Availability of units
  - It is often very difficult for prosecutors to find housing. Some have had to sleep on the floor in the office for long periods of time until housing became available.
- Decent quality
  - Units that are available many times lack necessities such as locks on the front door, running water, or working appliances.
- > Affordable
  - Many housing options require first and last month's rent as well as a deposit. This can be difficult for a new prosecutor to manage on top of student loan debt and other moving expenses.

## \$3.0M for housing - \$300,000 per unit estimate = 10 units

- ➤ Greatest need in Bethel, Utqiagvik, Kotzebue, Nome (in that order)
- ➤ One time cost to acquire. Rent charged to employees to pay for ongoing maintenance.

Not sure how long the project will take to complete, but will work to issue an RFP as soon as funding is secured.

#### \$400K Recruitment and Retention Program

- > Develop strategies and professional materials
- Targeted aggressive recruitment of talent in lower 48 right now and in future years as needed

### \$300K Training Materials for Sexual Assault and Sexual Abuse of Minor Cases

- Training for prosecutors is another key area for recruitment and retention
- > Develop off-the-shelf materials to be used internally for training
  - o For example, webinars, practice manuals, etc.
- ➤ Partnering with university to create a training facility for ongoing in-state training needs by remodeling a classroom to look like a courtroom for teaching and practicing trial advocacy

## \$300K Improved Technology for Efficiency

- ➤ Secure WiFi access in courthouses to access case files, e-file complaints and motions and issue discovery while in the courtroom
  - This allows prosecutors to have all of the information they need to respond to issues as they arise in court, creating efficiency in our practice
- ➤ Develop interface with Alaska Court System for exchange of case information
  - Next court dates
  - Receive court orders and decisions
