

COVID Impacts

- 75% of DEC staff currently teleworking
- Fieldwork safety guidelines
- Reasonable accommodation to permittees
 - Enforcement discretion
 - Increased communication
- Virtual inspections
- Lending workforce, expertise, and supplies to other agencies
- Piloted surveillance testing of wastewater with UAA
- Online public comment system (statewide)
- Digitizing files



COVID Impacts

- Fee suspensions (April August 2020)
 - Suspend interest accrual on invoices and imposition of late fees
 - Suspend fees for facilities that have closed, or are operating at reduced capacity
 - Suspend sanctions for failure to pay invoices
 - Suspend application fee due dates
 - Suspend the effective date of the 2020 adjustment of financial responsibility amounts




COVID Impacts

Cruise Ship Season

- 2020 season saw one small vessel (100% inspection rate!)
 - Conducted baseline ambient water quality sampling in port communities and common corridors
 - Developed approach for ambient air monitoring in port communities and set up new sensors in Juneau and Ketchikan for initial baseline effort
 - Lost revenue ~\$7.6 million to the Commercial Passenger Vessel Environmental Compliance (CPVEC) Fund
 - \$4.5 million appropriation from the CPVEC Fund to DCCED for port communities to prepare for COVID
- 2021 season remains uncertain
 - Canada's ban on cruise ships could stop all large vessels
 - May see a limited season for U.S. flagged small vessels
- If there is no, or a very limited season, the CPVEC Fund is projected to run a deficit in FY2021



Reduce Authority Due to Administrative Efficiencies

- Admin Services Division is able to reduce authority as a result of process improvements
- Reduce \$466.3 and 3 vacant positions
 - **(\$140.0) UGF**
 - (\$121.0) Oil/Haz
 - (\$152.7) Fed
 - (\$52.6) Other



Rebalance Use of Admin Fee Accounts

- 0.5% fees on loans from the Clean Water and Drinking Water State revolving loan funds (SRF) to administer the programs
- Fund source change
 - (\$52.7) ACWF
 - ► \$52.7 ADWF

<u>Transfer Authority for Grants Administrators</u>

- Three Grant Administrator positions transferred to Water at Management Plan
- Transfers the associated funding authority
 - (\$212.8) CIP
 - (\$88.7) ACWF
 - (\$53.2) ADWF



<u>Transfer Positions to DOA for Consolidation</u>

- Procurement staff have already transferred supervision
- Transfer three positions and shift line items to pay chargeback to DOA
 - (\$585.6) Personal Services
 - \$585.6 Services

<u>Unrealized Savings due to Delayed Project</u>

- Secured \$2.7 million loan for building improvements to reduce energy consumption
- Energy cost savings expected to offset annual loan payment over 15 years
- Project work completed in December 2020
- Won't realize a full fiscal year of savings
- FY2021 Supplemental request
 - ► \$70.0 UGF


Eliminate Dairy Safety Program

- Legislature and Governor restored FY2021 funding
- Dairy inspections and testing continue
- Permittees began to pay minimal fees

Reduce Commercial Shellfish Testing Subsidy

- Replaced commercial passenger vessel environmental compliance fees with UGF and fees to be paid by industry
- Legislature denied

Replace CPVEC Fees for Shellfish Testing

- The use of Commercial Passenger Vessel Environmental Compliance fees for shellfish testing violates the Tonnage Clause of the U.S Constitution
- Fund source change
 - (\$459.7) CPVEC
 - **\$459.7 UGF**



Reduce Prevention Account Expenditures


- Prevention Account fund sustainability concerns

- Legislature rejected
- Governor vetoed

Increase Oil/Haz Interagency Receipt Authority

- Accurately reflect average annual personal services charged to emergency responses
- Increased Oil/Haz IA \$375.0
- Legislature accepted

DEC FY2022 Operating Budget: Spill Prevention & Response (in thousands)

Reduce Prevention Account Expenditures

- Prevention Account funded by
 - \$0.04 per barrel of crude oil
 - \$0.0095 per gallon of refined fuel
- Fund projected to run a deficit as early as FY2026
- Reduce \$692.7 and 5 vacant positions
 - \$641.3 Oil/Haz
 - \$29.8 Fed
 - \$21.6 CPVEC



DEC FY2022 Operating Budget: Spill Prevention & Response (in thousands)

Program Impacts

- Reduced Capacity in Program Support Unit
- Reduced Capacity in the Aleutian/Western AK region
 - Five positions remain in this unit to cover the area in the event of a spill
- Reduced Capacity in Contaminated Sites
- Reduced administrative support

<u>Increase Inspections under Alaska Pollutant Discharge</u> <u>Elimination System (APDES) Program</u>

- Improve program inspection and enforcement performance
- Increased federal authority by \$573.0 and added four positions
- Legislature accepted

Regulate Wastewater in Port Communities

- Increased daily load in the summer has significant impacts on shore-based systems
- Fund source change \$454.6 UGF to commercial passenger vessel environmental compliance fees
- Legislature denied




- Multiple high profile permit appeals
- Increased compliance monitoring in line with primacy requirements from EPA
- Above and beyond normal annual legal costs
- FY2021 Supplemental Request
 - **\$236.9 UGF**



FY2020 Performance Measures: Division of Environmental Health



Federal Primacy Program ensures community water systems are safe, healthy, and in compliance with federal guidelines



Inspections prioritized at high-risk and medium-risk facilities, or by complaint basis. Remote nature of facilities makes more regular inspections difficult.



FY2020 Performance Measures: Division of Air Quality




Compliance of permitted stationary sources of pollution such as power plants, refineries, and oil and gas production has increased from 58% to 81% since FY2011




Timely issuance of Air Quality permits is a high priority for the department. Permit issuance rates can be linked directly to economic activity in the exploration and development sectors.



FY2020 Performance Measures: Division of Spill Prevention & Response




Steadily reducing the number of high priority contaminated sites. Progress slows as remaining sites are the most challenging.




Regular inspections of regulated facilities and vessel operators for required Oil Discharge Prevention and Contingency Plans.



FY2020 Performance Measures: Division of Water



Alaska APDES primacy program is responsive to industry permitting needs with a robust review and issuance rate of permits which protects public health and the environment.



Statewide certification levels for water operators remains consistently above 80%, but certification levels for water operators in rural communities is only 50%.



PFAS Contamination & Real Estate Transactions

- No PFAS-specific requirements related to real estate transactions
- DCCED under the Real Estate Commission has statutes requiring the disclosure of water supply contaminants and environmental concerns
 - DCCED or Law would need to determine if this applies to PFAS
- Uniform Environmental Covenants Act (UECA)
 - Residences with known contamination may sign covenants with requirements such as residents not using groundwater on the property (ex. Moose Creek)
 - Responsibility of the seller to disclose
 - Also shows up in a title search
