FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA 2021 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

BILL NO. HB 32

Analysis

This bill adds new sections to AS 09.65 related to recreational vehicle park owners and private campgrounds. The first new section would provide immunity from civil liability for damage to guest property resulting from state or municipal action.
The second new section relates to immunity from civil liability related to the inherent risks of camping. First, it provides that an owner of a private campground, employee, or officer is not liable for civil damages relating to campground features such as tree stumps, unpredictable terrain, campfires, wild animals, and guest's animals. This provision also covers damages related to actions of other guests, such as negligence or ignition of fireworks, and actions of persons who are not guests of the campground. This immunity does not cover damages that are the result of gross negligence, recklessness or intentional misconduct or failure to post required warnings. This section requires that a private campground post signs warning of any dangerous and inconspicuous condition known by an owner or employee that previously caused injury. This warning should likewise be included in any written contract between the campground and a guest.
The Department of Law does not anticipate any fiscal impact if this bill becomes law.
