


Child Protection Attorneys

- Represent the Office of Children's Services (OCS) in all court involved Child in Need of Aid (CINA) cases.
- 7 offices across the state:
 - Anchorage
 - Palmer
 - Bethel Partially staffed through Anchorage
 - Nome/Kotzebue staffed through Anchorage
 - Kenai
 - Fairbanks Partially staffed through Anchorage
 - Juneau





Child Protection Attorney Caseloads


24 Case-carrying Assistant Attorney Generals Caseload Averages



An Average Month for an AAG

60 court appearances per month

Misconception:

OCS profits by taking kids away from their parents.

Fact:

In reality, Alaska is only reimbursed about 38 cents for every Alaskan dollar spent. Child Protective Services is not a money-making venture.

Misconception:

Children are rarely returned to their parents.

Fact:

In 2021, over half of the children who left foster care went home to their families.

Misconception:

OCS hearings are secret.

Fact:

Most OCS hearings are open to the public and have been since 2005.
