FY2023 Highways Budgetary Actions

\$17,756.4 UGF (Fund Change)

Reverse One-Time Fund Source Change: used FHWA CRRSAA Funding to Displace UGF

\$620.0 FHWA CRRSAA (One Time) One Time Item: Federal relief funding will be utilized to support ongoing maintenance and operating costs for the Silvertip maintenance station in FY2023

\$794.6 FHWA CRRSAA (One-Time)

One Time Item: Federal relief funding will be utilized to support ongoing maintenance and operating costs for the Birch Lake and Chitina maintenance stations in FY2023

\$1,298.6F FHWA CRRSAA (One-Time)

One Time Item: Federal relief funding will be utilized to support Dalton District shift change in FY2023.

\$4,119.9 Motor Fuel Tax (Fund Change)

Use of federal funds to support Marine Highway operations makes motor fuel tax receipt authority available for use to support highway maintenance.

\$85.0 UGF, \$21.2 CIP (Transfer)


Transfer Safety Officer position to Central Region Support Services to align with reporting structure and reflect regional wide role.




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Regional Highways & Aviation (\$141,780.0)

Statewide Level of Service Consistency

Roadway Priorities and Levels of Service

Priority 1: High volume, high-speed roadways, such as expressways and safety corridors

Priority 2: Major highways and arterials connecting communities

Priority 3: Major local roads or collector roads

Priority 4: Minor local roads that primarily provide residential or recreational access


Priority 5: Roadways that are designated as "No Winter Maintenance" routes, such as Denali Highway and Taylor Highway

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Highway Maintenance & Operations

- Snow and Ice Control, Snow Plowing and Removal, Anti-icing and Deicing, Sanding
- Avalanche Mitigation
- Asphalt Repairs: Hi-Float, AC, Potholes, Crack Sealing, etc.
- Blading and Gravel Resurfacing
- Drainage: Thaw and clean culverts, drainage ditch maintenance, and Erosion Control
- Vegetation Management
- Pavement Marking
- Bridge Maintenance and Repair
- Signs, Delineation, Guardrail, and Markers
- Traffic Signal and Light Maintenance



Resources Required

To meet the challenges of maintaining Alaska's highways and airports, the department requires an arsenal of equipment, new technologies, sand and chemicals, and a highly trained maintenance staff.

Benefits

- Increased efficiency and production (One pass clearing, improved cycle times, wider clearing path)
- Reduction in manpower and equipment
- Environmental benefits from using less fuel
- Safety improvements due to improved cycle times
- Longer service life than snowplow trucks
