- ASARA is a statewide, non-profit affiliation of search and rescue organizations and individuals.
- ASARA's mission is to support the training of search and rescue personnel across the state of Alaska and bridge with the Alaska State Troopers on behalf of search and rescue volunteer organizations.
- 400 search and rescue missions across the state of Alaska every year saving the state hundreds of thousands of dollars in man-hours. Saving approximately 350 lives across the state of Alaska each year.
- ASARA represents over 500 search and rescue professional volunteers throughout Alaska
- Since 2005, ASARA has provided training for over 1000 search and rescue personnel, representing over 25 different volunteer organizations, and municipality, state, and federal agencies.
- At the request of the Alaska State Troopers, ASARA supported the development of a Type III Incident Management Team (AIMT-SAR) specific to Search and Rescue. The AIMT-SAR deployed for the first-time summer 2013, and it continues its mission today.
- There are only approximately 25 K9s in the State that are in a Certified
 Deployable Status for Live Find, Human Remains Detection mostly for Alaska
 State Troopers, they also perform Avalanche Recovery, Recovery for Drowning
 Victims (K9s can smell drowning victim's body oils) as well as Trail Victims such
 as Ashley Johnson for Law Enforcement. These K9s have in the last few years
 have deployed across the State.

Example

Abduction of Ashley Johnson from Kotzebue,

Alaska Search and Rescue Association sent their Alaska Incident Management Team (AIMT) to assist the one VPSO and 3 Policemen in Kotzebue when Ashley was abducted to manage the 100-150 volunteers daily that were coming to assist in her search. This Team offloaded the local officials in Incident Management so that the Police and one VPSO could continue with their law enforcement duties.

"With a commissioned count of less than 300 troopers, AST depends heavily upon the professional volunteer search and rescue organizations. There are roughly 48 volunteer organizations statewide. These volunteers drop what they are doing to answer the call for help that often interrupts regular - day jobs and family life."
