



- Increased the efficiency of our schools and decreased our O&M budget by more than 20%.
- Worked with our Assembly to secure the maximum level of funding they can provide BBBSD.
- Developed a working relationship with our Public Works department to help our maintenance director meet school district needs.
- We have secured both State and Federal grants to support our Pre-K programming.
- Most of our high school students now have one or more distance delivery courses.

I had the opportunity to testify by phone to the House education committee earlier in the year on these bills. I would have rather testified in person or by phone as I believe that has more of an impact when you feel the words as opposed to reading them. I am store manager for Howsers IGA in Haines, a supermarket, and in the current job climate just cannot find the time to make it to Juneau or call in for that matter with the shortage of workers. Hopefully this will change but does show the current economic climate our country is in. The result of all of the recent decisions/policies of the federal government, pandemic and other factors is the astounding high inflation. As you know the cost has gone up on EVERYTHING.

We, Howsers IGA, have been receiving 1000-1200 price increase per week since October and were informed this week by our wholesaler pricing dept. that it is going to get worse. Milk is now \$10 a gallon for whole milk in Haines, the price is still below our industry standard for that product. The fuel surcharge went from 15% to 23% this month. I have been in the grocery business since 1982 and have never seen price increases across the board like now with no end in sight. The skyrocketing cost of maintenance alone can alter the budget.

As a teacher in Southwest Region School District, I very much appreciates the House Finance Committee's work on school funding this session, in particular on HB272 and HB273, to address the critical financial shortfalls being experienced in Alaskan schools today, due to the effects of flat funding exacerbated by economic stresses not seen in our state in a generation.

The trend of rising fixed costs for our schools has been impacting our schools for a decade now, and in the past two years this trend has risen to near catastrophic levels. Rapidly rising costs for fuel, utilities, food for lunch programs, shipping of educational materials and supply chain driven cost increases across all departments are making it nearly impossible for districts' to address students' basic needs. This trend is affecting districts' ability to:

- adequately compensate staff (causing difficulty in hiring and retention, which both have an impact on learning)
- fund critical educational initiatives (including recovery of lost instructional time due to the pandemic)
- adequately address a host of student needs (not the least of which are mental health issues driven by the isolation of the pandemic).
- adequately maintain facilities at a reasonable level.

Many students at my school have expressed that they feel discouraged and depressed. The financial crisis impacts them every day, when we don't have adequate staff to meet all the student needs, and the school building has areas which aren't not maintained, and equipment that is used daily isn't replaced because of budget cuts.

This financial crisis also increases the gap between the schools on and off the road system, since the cost of transportation to the schools off the road system is so much more. Our students in rural Alaska deserve equitable educational opportunities to those on the road system, but much of our funding is having to be spent on the high cost of fuel and transporting supplies and materials, causing deficits in other areas.

The increases addressed in Amendments #3 by Rep. Johnson and Amendment #5 by Rep. Josephson to HB272 are steps in a very positive direction. These increases, though appearing dramatic, only address half of the deficit caused in just the last year by increases in fuel and other fixed costs driven by it.

I encourage you to pass Amendments #3 and #5 before moving this bill to the rest of the House.

Dear Co-Chairs and Members of the House Finance Committee:

My name is Frank Hauser, and I'm the Superintendent of the Sitka School District. I am providing written testimony today in support of HB 272 and HB 273, Increase Base Student Allocation and Increase Base Student Allocation Inflation.

The Sitka School District is facing a budget deficit of \$1,874,069 for FY23, which represents almost 10% of our total general fund budget.

"Flat funding" sounds benign, but every year of flat funding, since 2017, has represented a loss to districts because it does not provide for inflation and for increased yearly costs, such as utilities, student transportation, and insurance. In FY23, health insurance rates are increasing in my district by 9.5%, or \$313,966. The increase to health insurance rates in one year alone represents the cost of over three teachers. Multiple years of flat funding and increased costs have continued to erode Alaska's ability to keep educators in classrooms.

We have been forced to make significant cuts to teachers, administrators, support staff, and programs due to flat funding of the BSA since 2017. In my district, we no longer have a dedicated librarian at either our K-1 or middle schools. Alaskan students today do not have the benefits of the same programs, resources, and staff that I did, when I attended public school in Alaska.

We are not able to "cut ourselves out" of this deficit without having significant negative impacts on our pupil teacher ratio (PTR), programs, and educational system as a whole. HB 272 or HB 273 would not close our existing \$1,874,069 deficit in Sitka, but any increase to the BSA would help save teaching positions and valuable programs in my district. It would also support our ability to retain and attract the high-quality educators and educational professionals the students of Alaska deserve. Reliable funding brings stability. The stakes have never been higher, and the needs, never so great.



My name is Terri Walker. I am currently the Superintendent of the Northwest Arctic Borough School District. I have worked for the district for 32 years, serving the people of this region. I appreciate your time to read this written testimony on HB 272 and HB 273, two bills our Board of Education and School District strongly support.

Our district serves 13 schools in 11 communities. There are no roads in or out of our communities, so everything must be flown in during winter. We make every effort to barge fuel and oversized items during the summer. Unfortunately, for some villages, the river water may never get high enough for a barge to make it, so fuel and other large items must then be flown in, which increases our costs tremendously.

At its core, HB 272 and HB 273 increases, and Inflation proofs the Base Student Allocation. Although the bills are simple, their effects are profound and long overdue.

The state's current budget process does not account for Inflation, nor has the Based Student Allocation (BSA) been increased since 2017. Unfortunately, Inflation is what our schools face today. The result is and continues to be budget cuts. Here are some examples of the fixed cost increases we have seen in our district:

- From FY 21 to FY 22, year-to-date, there has been a 16% increase in our heating fuel expenses. This increase is after bidding to buy our fuel in bulk.
- From FY2019 to 2021, increased freight cost to villages by \$.10 for freight over 10 pounds, which equals about a 10% increase. Freight minimums have also increased by \$5, about a 20% increase.
- From FY18 to FY 21, Food services costs have increased by 12.27%, and we will see another increase based on CPI (consumer price index) in FY 23. As a title one school district, we qualify for 100% free meals for all students. However, USDA reimburses only 40% of what it costs to feed our children. Because of the ongoing, increased cost of food and shipping, our district supplements over 1 million dollars each year. We are thankful for the cares act and ARPA funds that we have been able to cover these costs thru 2024. But these are one-time funds that are going away.

MISSION: To provide a learning environment that inspires and challenges students and employees to excel VISION: To graduate all students with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary for a successful future

- From FY17 to FY20, negotiated increases with staff are 4.5%, and the district is currently bargaining with staff for increases over the next three years.
- From FY17 to FY21, NWABSD Health insurance costs per employee increased by roughly 20% and are expected to increase another 3% from FY21 to FY22.

Inflation and flat funding have diminished student opportunities across our great state. They are slowly hollowing out public education and opportunities for our students.

Below are some cuts we have had to make:

- we have cut prek
- we have cut career & technical education programs in all our villages
- We have reduced our counselors by half
- we have cut all elementary and middle school student activities and greatly reduced funding for high school activities.
- We have cut administration teaching and support staff positions.

It is hard to balance the budget and decide what programs are next to go. Already, our students do not have music teachers, art teachers, PE teachers, CTE teachers, fulltime counselors or other special teachers who relieve our classroom teachers during the day to allow for collaboration and planning.

It is time to address education funding and inflation proofing the BSA. If we do not, we are hurting Alaska's students and our states' future leaders by not fully funding public education or accounting for Inflation in the state's education budget.

Thank you for considering HB 272/273 for an increase and inflation-proof to the BSA.

The BSA has not received any increase since FY17, forcing districts across the state to continually find ways to deal with continued increases in fixed costs such as energy costs, rising healthcare costs, classroom supplies, as well as our obligations to our staff to provide them with the increases in their salaries outlined in their negotiated agreements. Over time, this has resulted in a gradual erosion in supply budgets, neglect of facilities, cuts in support positions, and eventually cuts in classroom positions. The outcomes of these sustained small cuts have been revealed and exacerbated by the recent COVID pandemic combined with the dramatic increases in inflation, supply chain issues and inability to fill vacant positions, and are now seen in desperate attempts by teachers, principals and superintendents to bind up the wounds to our schools, our students, our staff and the education profession as a whole. These cuts over time have directly impacted our abilities to meet our students' needs in areas such as mental health, a full and rich curriculum with diverse and rigorous college preparatory coursework, preparation for work in trades and entry into the workforce, full grounding in their cultural identity and connections to their place and heritage, as well as confidence and hope in their own future.

Nome Public Schools is grappling with several recent and unanticipated increases in expenditures for the coming school year, including a possible increase in our fuel purchase of anywhere between \$250,000 and \$375,000 due to a dramatic increase in the cost of fuel oil. We purchase all of our heating fuel at once since it comes in on the barge at the end of the summer along with the City of Nome's purchase, so we can't wait to take advantage of possible drops in the price of fuel later in the year. In addition, we have sent our health insurance out to bid, since our current provider has stated we are looking at an increase in premiums of 20-25% for the coming year. Our district pays 85% of the health insurance premiums for our employees, so such a large increase is painful for employer and employee alike.

The projected increase to our revenues that we would receive should HB272 pass would allow us to cover the increased cost of our fuel purchase, but we will still need to make additional cuts to our budget to adjust for any other expenditure increases.

We are grateful that the legislature has heard our requests for assistance and is now considering legislation to increase the BSA for the first time in many years. Please continue showing your support for public education and the children of Alaska by rejecting any amendments to decrease or cut the proposed BSA for FY23 or FY24 in House Bill 272.

My husband and I feel very strongly that we may need to leave the state to seek a better future for our family. We are both award winning teachers in this state who have working in rural villages, road system schools, started academic and extracurricular activities in our sites, and thrown our lives into teaching. It is our passion, yet, we may still leave. Our future is at stake.

As an Alaska educator I am deeply concerned about the future of our students, our public schools, and my profession.

We are at a crossroads as a state in terms of how we value our constitutionally guaranteed system of public education. Alaska educators are leaving the profession and the state at unprecedented levels due to flat funding, the lack of a real retirement system, and staffing shortages. Whenever a teacher or education support professional leaves, it's our students who suffer the most.

As my legislator, I am urging you to address the following priorities which would provide immediate relief to thousands of educators and students across Alaska. Ultimately, it comes down to three legislative priorities; access to Pre-K programs, increases to the Base Student Allocation (BSA), and retirement.

Early access to learning is critical to life-long success. I believe all students should have access to high-quality, voluntary Pre-Kindergarten programs to learn basic skills and prepare them for the future. The Alaska State Legislature should immediately pass legislation that prioritizes access to Pre-K programs for the greatest number of young Alaskans.

Secondly, Alaska's public schools have been flat-funded since 2017, while the fixed costs for districts have risen and inflation has risen over 11%. The diminished purchasing power of school districts has led to staffing shortages, program cuts to Career and Technical training programs, the elimination of sports, and increased class sizes. Inflation, rising energy costs, and skyrocketing healthcare costs pull more and more resources away from the classroom every year. An increase in education funding through the BSA would have immediate and positive impacts on the lives of students and educators across the state.

Hello, my name is Alisha Asplund, I live in D8 and wish to testify against HB272 HB273. Please enter my testimony into the public record.

I am against HB 272 and HB273 because if they were binding, they would be dedicating funds for a special purpose It wastes of limited recourses to pass mere suggestions, it highlights a lack of trust that current legislators have in future legislators ability to accomplish their constitutional responsibilities.

I know that the some legislators have made comment that imply that since the constitution says the legislature is responsible of educating Alaskans, this gives the legislature the power to create bills such as HB 272 and HB273 that dedicate funding to the education of Alaskans, and ignore Article IX Sections 7. I believe that the opposite was made clear in State v. Alex

The defendants claim that the legislature's power to deal with natural resources of the state, contained in article VIII, gives the legislature the power to create a dedicated fund, despite the express prohibition of dedicated funds contained in article IX, section 7. They particularly emphasize the legislature's and the state's powers to provide 211\*211 facilities for the development of fisheries under section 5<sup>[7]</sup> and the power to promote the development of aquaculture under section 15.<sup>[8]</sup>

Despite defendants' contentions to the contrary, section 530 assessments are an exercise of the taxing power, the purpose of which is to raise revenue to construct hatcheries. Nothing contained in article VIII can be construed to grant the legislature the power to ignore other express constitutional limitations on its taxing power just because it is legislating in an area that concerns natural resources, such as fisheries or aquaculture.

This can help us understand that nothing contained in the articles of the constitution dealing with education gives legislators the power to ignore other expressed constitutional limitations. So, education has to compete right alongside all the other critical budget items in the "annual appropriation model" as expressed in Sonneman v. Hickel

The constitutional clause prohibiting dedicated funds seeks to preserve an annual appropriation model which assumes that not only will the legislature remain free to appropriate all funds for any purpose on an annual basis, but that government departments will not be restricted in requesting funds from all sources. As the debates make clear, all departments were to be "in the same position" as competitors for funds with the need to "sell their viewpoint along with everyone else." 4 PACC 2364-67 (Jan. 17, 1956). We conclude therefore that the limitations on the ability of DOTPF to ask for funds from the Marine Highway System Fund expressed in AS 19.65.080(b) amount to a dedication in violation of article IX, section 7.

So even though HB272 and HB273 deal with education and the legislature has the power to deal with education. The legislature cannot create binding stature that dedicate state revenue to a special

purpose, they have to trust that future legislators will be as smart and capable as they are and that future legislators will be able use the constitutional "annual appropriation model" to create a budget that uses the available state money for the public purpose of creating a budget that is solely for the good of the people as a whole, while taking into consideration all the unique challenges that will arise that past legislators will have had no way of knowing about and might make it hard for the future legislators to follow all the nonbinding suggestion that past legislators believed were such great ideas using their assumptions about the future as a guide.

Since legislators do not have a crystal ball to see into the future with, they should spend less time wasting the limited resources and time available make suggestions to futures legislators and spend more time focusing on make the best annual budget they can, with the resources that they have, taking into consideration the unique challenges they are currently facing.

By creating statures that make these kinds of suggestions, current legators are saying that they do not trust future legislators to act honorable and ethically, do what is best for the people as a whole when making the annual appropriations in the annual budget process, continue to fund critical budget items with the annual money available for appropriations to the level needed to fund the critical services of the state are the level need to create a state that is socially, economically, and politically sound. Current legislators must not believe that future legislators will be able make a budget in which the states limited money is use in the most efficient way to accomplish the best public purpose that is for the good of the people as a whole.

And if current legislators do not trust future legislators with these kinds of decisions than how can Alaskans trust current legislators to make these kinds of decisions?

It seems that current legislators are willing to waste the limited time and resource trying to pass mere suggestion that can be ignored. How many of the following resource does it take to move a bill through both house:

- Office supplies- paper, ink, etc.
- Man hours office staff, legal staff, janitorial staff, invited testimony, experts etc.
- Power -computers, light, camera, printers, etc.
- Cost of legislature session days- Each day that the legislature would not have had to reaming in session, if time had not been wasted on passing nonbinding suggestions.

Just think all the money wasted on bills that are mere suggestions, that could have been used for service or program that would benefit Alaskans more, than a nonbinding statute that can be ignores will and would be unconstitutional if it were binding.

It is as if legislators are more worried about passing non-binding statutes that they can point to in their next reelection campaign to say they have done something even if they know that something is a meaningless non-binding suggestion. But then again Alaskans rightfully believe that laws/statutes are- rules formally recognized as binding and enforceable, so, they believe the that their legislator has made a meaningful change not just wasted state resources on a mere suggestion.

I am not saying that I am against funding education, because the proper education of Alaskans is critical to the economic, social, and political stability of our state. We may be struggling with accomplishing these lofty goals but this is not because of money but because we seem to have forgotten the purpose of education. It is not the ability to recite facts and other people's ideas in order to pass an assessment and get a diploma but as this quote from the constitutional convention papers folder 211 page 10 says "If we are to solve the problems of the industrial, scientific, and democratic society every person must learn to think for himself about the fundamental issues of human life and

responsibility for education rests upon the State. The United States has become industrial, scientific and democratic and as far as anyone can foresee, this type of social order will prevail for the next 50 or 100 years. The nation is committed to democracy wherein, as Robert M. Hutchins puts it "Every man is a ruler". If we are to solve the problems of an industrial, scientific and democratic society every person must learn to think for himself about the fundamental issues of human life and organized society. For a democratic society the alternatives are education, or the abandonment of universal suffrage. A democratic State must educate or die. In a democratic State then, education becomes a right as sacred and fundamental as the freedom of speech, freedom of the press and an impartial judiciary. For these

society".

I think this idea is critical so that all Alaskans can help find new solutions not relive old mistakes. I know that there is hope, and that there are great teachers out there doing the best they can. But while more money seems like such an easy answer, the problems in the system will not go away until we can find a way for teacher to facilitate the growth of the love of learning in hearts of their students so that those students will continue to learn and grow even after they have placed all the "correct answers" into their assessments and gotten their diploma.

That being said funding education is still a part of the annual budget process and still must comply with the "annual appropriation model" laid out in the constitution.

I believe that this bill would fall into the mere suggestion category #3 which I cannot support. See bill categories below.

### \*Information on the categories of bills

For nearly a year I have been trying to figure out why legislators keep making cryptic and vague comments about these kinds of bills not being binding and stating that these kinds of bills can be ignored, or imply other kinds of bills can evade the effects of rules prescribed in the constitution. But I wish to make it clear that I do not believe it to be the intent of the constitution for legislators to purposely create bills that will mislead the people of Alaska into believing that they are creating a bill that will (insert designated fund description or unconstitutional language) then the legislators insert somewhere else in the bill a direct contradiction (insert constitutionally sound language) so a court could give the legislators the benefit of the doubt and say the legislators and the lawyers who write the bills are so incompetent that they are unable to write a constitutional sound bill that does not contain non-binding, or unconstitutional language that would create an unconstitutional law if it was binding or if it was not directly contradicted somewhere else in the bill.

It all started when I watched the April 29th 2021 House Ways and Means Committee, and during that meeting a legislator made the following statements:

- "It is true that the legislature can ignore statutes. That is constitutionally allowed."
- "Because we ultimately make the laws and therefore, we have the ability to disregard law"

She gave these statements to justify why the bill she wished to pass could and should be ignored.

In the February 4, 2022 House Education meeting the same legislator made comments that explained why the bill she wrote would create a statute that could be ignore- the reason it can be ignored is because it had been purposely written to be a nonbinding suggestion. She also seemed to be saying that there were many examples of these nonbinding suggestions already in statute and that made it ok to make another one.

And then in the March 14 House Finance Committee I learned that bills were being written attempting to create funds, accounts that could hold state revenue so that it was beyond the reach of constitutional limitation. And would not be subject to the constitutions rules that control state revenue and appropriations.

From further information that I collected by watching nearly all committee meetings and floor sessions, during the 2021 legislative season and multiple committee meeting in 2022, and reading bill and court cases, I found what seems to be the following categories for the bills that current legislators feel it is ok to try to pass: (This is a work in progress and may change as I continue to watch and ask questions. I wish to make it very clear that category #1 is the only bill category that I feel legislators can make without violating constitutional intent, undermining the integrity of the legislative branch of government, eroding the rule of law, violating the Ethics Act AS 24.60.010, and/or violate their oath of office.)

- 1) Bills that will result in statutes/laws that current legislators understand to be binding and enforceable and believe to be constitutionally sound.
  - a) By constitutionally sound, I mean legislators and legislative lawyers do not believe the Supreme Court would rule that the binding law would conflict with the constitution.
  - b) A binding law that legislators are not allowed to ignore, but would be allowed to change through the legislative process, for passing a bill into law.
  - c) Does not contain contradicting descriptions and language, easily misunderstood legal language, misleading plain language that can be interpreted differently by the courts, legislators, and the general public.
- 2) Bills that will result in statutes/laws that legislators believe can be ignored, because legislators think the constitution allows it, because they believe the binding law violates the constitution.
  - a) I do not believe the constitution intended legislators to purposely create a statute/law that legislators feel can be ignored because legislators believe it will contradict or violate the constitution or they feel the Supreme Court has allowed them to ignore similar statutes/laws.
  - b) I feel that knowingly creating laws that legislators believe will conflict with the constitution, does not "assure the trust, respect, and confidence of the people of this state", which is covered in the Ethics Act AS 24.60.010. It is also behavior that does not "preserve the integrity of the legislative process" which is another item mentioned in AS 24.60.010
  - c) I believe that knowingly creating bills that they believe would violate the constitution if they were binding, enforceable laws, is a violation of Article XII Section 5 of the constitution.
- 3) Bills that will result in statutes/laws that legislators purposely create to be non-binding so that they can be ignored.
  - a) I do not believe it is the intent of the constitution for the legislator to purposely make a statue/law that is not intended to be binding or enforceable.
  - b) I do not believe that it is the intent of the constitution for legislators to change the definition of law to a mere suggestion that is non-binding and not enforceable, thus undermine the idea that the definition of law as a rule formally recognized as binding and enforceable. I believe that by suggesting that a law can be a mere non-binding suggestion, these legislators are undermining the very idea of the "rule of law"
  - c) I feel that purposely creating laws that can be ignored does not assure the trust, respect, and confidence of the people of this state, and is not a representation of the moral and ethical standard mentioned in AS24.60.010 (1)
  - d) It is also behavior that does not preserve the integrity of the legislative process or the integrity of the legislative process, which are also items mentioned in AS 24.60.010 (2)
  - e) I believe creating a "law" which is only a suggestion and a way that current legislators can place political pressure on future legislators to continue to fund these past legislators special interest project, is a not only a disservice to future Alaskans who many have other special interest they wish to fund but also, a disservice to current Alaskans because working on these non-binding suggestions wastes limited time and resources and is often the reason legislators choose to work past the 90-day regular session. This requires state revenue to be used for keeping the legislative session up and running for an additional 30 or more days and then that state revenue cannot be used for critical services or capital project.
- 4) Bills that will result in statutes/laws that current legislators believe they can disregard because they believe in the acceptability of Representative Spohnholz's statement from the April 29th 2021 House Ways and Means Committee, "Because we ultimately make the laws and therefore, we have the ability to disregard law"
  - a) This seems to imply that legislators believe they are above all laws which I do not believe is the intent of the constitution and is a horrendously bad belief for legislators to have.

- b) I feel that this statement undermines the integrity of the legislative branch of government. How are the people in this state supposed to trust, respect, and have confidence in the branch of government that makes the laws, if that very branch shows no respect for the laws that it makes.
- c) There is a difference between disregarding a law or going through the legislative process to change a law. The end result may be the same but only one of those ways upholds the integrity of the legislative process.
- d) After hearing Spohnholz's comments in the February 4, 2022 Education meeting it seems one reason why current unethical and immoral legislators might wrongly believe this statement is true, legislators no longer believes that a law is - A rule formally recognized as binding and enforced by controlling authorities, but instead current legislators and the lawyers who advise them believe a "law" is – merely a suggestion that can be disregarded. That is a terrifying belief for the law enacting branch of the government to hold.
- Bills that will result in statutes/laws that legislators have purposely written with contracting language so that legislators will be able to work outside the limitations of the constitutions but if any one brings the statute before the courts it contains language that will the fool the courts into believing legislators did not intentionally mean to make a statute that allowed them to act outside the limitations of the constitution. These kinds of bills often contain direct contradictions: one part of the bill will contain language that allows legislator to easily accomplish their goal but would be interpreted as being unconstitutional, and a different part of the bill will contain language that is constitutional but would not allow legislators to easily accomplish their goal.
  - a) I do not believe it is the intent of the constitution for the legislator to purposely make a law that contain contradicting and misleading language so that they can act outside the limits of the constitution.
  - b) I feel that purposely creating laws which they will use to act outside the limitations of the constitutions is a violation of their oath of office to support and defend the constitution. Article XII Section 5.
  - c) I feel that to purposely write a bill with the intent of fooling the courts and the people of Alaska into believing different and contradicting interpretations, while legislators use it to act outside the limitation of the constitution does not assure the trust, respect, and confidence of the people of this state, and is not a representation of the moral and ethical standard mentioned in AS24.60.010 (1)
  - d) It is also behavior that does not preserve the integrity of the legislative process, which is mentioned in AS 24.60.010(2) 15-200

#### Sec. 24.60.010. Legislative findings and purpose.

The legislature finds that

- (1) high moral and ethical standards among public servants in the legislative branch of government are essential to assure the trust, respect, and confidence of the people of this state;
- (2) a fair and open government requires that legislators and legislative employees conduct the public's business in a manner that preserves the integrity of the legislative process and avoids conflicts of interest or even appearances of conflicts of interest;

#### Section 5. Oath of Office

All public officers, before entering upon the duties of their offices shall take and subscribe to the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Alaska, and that I will faithfully discharge my duties as . . . to the best of my ability." The legislature may prescribe further oaths or affirmations.

Good morning Representative Merrick and House Finance Members,

My Name is Andy Ratliff and I am the OMB Director for the Anchorage School District. I would like to offer testimony regarding potential amendments to be considered for HB272.

Regarding Amendment #1 - by including correspondence schools at the beginning of the Foundation Formula, this amendment would create an inherent inequity in funding between brick and mortar schools and correspondence schools based on the costs associated with the instructional delivery models. The costs associated with providing education at a comprehensive high school that provides gyms and fields for sports, auditoriums for music and theater, shops for CTE courses, and kitchen/cafeteria spaces to feed students, are not comparable to a correspondence school that can operate in limited space and scale up or down the number of students without a need to adjust building sizes. Additionally, there is considerably more staffing, both direct instruction and ancillary supports, necessary to provide face to face services than through a correspondence model, yet this amendment would provide the same funding to each.

By allowing more of the State's limited resources to be shifted to correspondence schools, the value of public education in brick and mortar schools will be significantly eroded as the families that have the ability and the means to stay home with their children will do so while families without those same means will remain in brick and mortar schools.

This testimony is not to say that funding levels for correspondence schools, or brick and mortar schools for that matter, are adequate. The current model provides a reasonable funding disparity between these two types of instructional delivery, however, BSA increases to catch up to, and keep pace with, inflation are necessary to ensure a strong education for Alaska students. Permanent BSA increases for FY23 and FY24, addressed in Amendment #3, and adjusting for inflation in later years will allow districts across the state to develop long term financial plans and focus on educational outcomes rather than being reactionary year after year.
