- Representative Story requested a copy of the HB114 bill.
 An enacted version of Chapter 40, SLA 2022 (<u>HB114</u>¹) may be found on the Alaska State Legislature website and is attached as *Enclosure 1 HB0114Z*.
- Representative Co-chair Ruffridge requested the number of students who are not proficient in reading based on the AK STAR assessment.

The AK STAR is a summative assessment that was given in the spring of 2022 to students in grades 3-9. The assessment uses four proficiency ratings: Advanced, Proficient, Approaching, and Needs Support. Third grade English Language Arts assessment ratings for spring of 2022 are as follows:

- o Advanced: 12.1%
- Proficient: 8.5%
- Approaching: 35.3%
- Needs Support: 44.2%

Combining the percentages from the "Approaching" and "Needs Support" ratings, the total number of third grade students that were not proficient in English Language Arts on the AK STAR summative assessment was 79.5%.

• Representative McCormick requested information about the Department of Education and Early Development's plan to support school districts that are not on the road system with broadband internet connection challenges?

Alaska Department of Education and Early Development plans to support all schools with implementation of Alaska Reads Act. The majority of the components of the Alaska Reads Act are implemented independent of internet requirements; however, a few parts of the act are supported through internet-based programs and connections. As an alternative, those parts are accessible through paper-and-pencil (such as the literacy screener) and telephone connections for discussions. The virtual education component would be challenging with limited broadband connection; however, this program is voluntary.
