SEF & HEWCF

Highway Equipment Working Capital Fund (HEWCF 1026)

- The HEWCF is used to maintain the fleet and replace fleet vehicles
- SEF receives no direct General Fund appropriation; funding comes from fees paid by other state agencies
- SEF's rate system is designed to 'break even' or allocate all costs to customers
- SEF is a shared service:
 - All Executive Branch Agencies have SEF vehicles and equipment
 - SEF also provides asset management services for AHFC, University of Alaska, AK Railroad, AK Aerospace

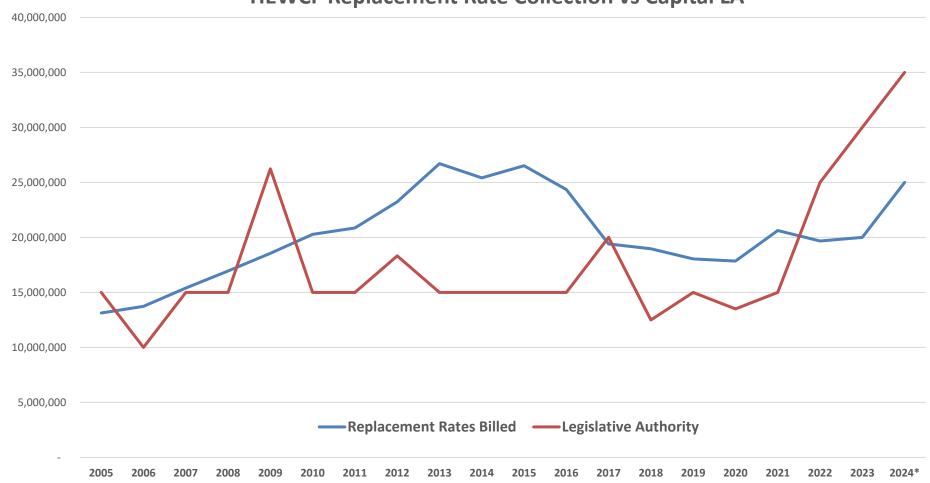

Budget Breakdown

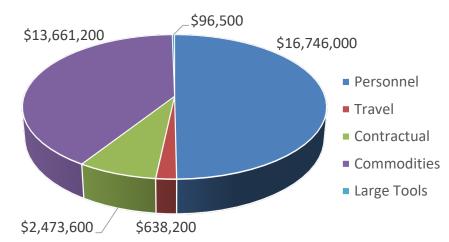
Operating highlights:

SEF Challenges New & Old

Workforce Challenges

Difficult to recruit statewide urban
 & rural

Supply Chain shortages present manufacturing challenges

- Manufacturers' ordering windows shrinking, build times expanding
- Longer lead times for new equipment
 & repair parts



Emissions & electronics on new equipment not AK friendly

- Exhaust aftertreatment systems with DEF
- Electronics not suited for severe climate

Aging facilities create difficulties maintaining equipment

Larger equipment requires larger more complex facilities



Challenges - Solutions

Workforce

- Shifting to hub style staffing model
- More flexible and alternative work schedules

Parts availability & supply chain



- Retaining totaled & damaged equipment for spare parts
- Value of spare parts exceeds disposal/auction value
- Leveraging federal surplus for assets & parts
- Worldwide sourcing of repair parts

Emissions & Electronics

- Rebuilding graders & other equipment w/o DEF systems
- Providing warranty services: Ford, GM, Heavy Equipment
- Purchasing truck cab & chassis vs total replacement
