FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

STATE OF ALASKA
2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

BILL NO. HB 4

Analysis

This legislation proposes changes to Alaska's election laws that would eliminate the open primary system and ranked choice voting system.

Should this bill pass, a public education campaign would need to take place in FY24 and FY25 to inform candidates, voters, and election workers of the changes to the primary and general election processes.

The Division of Election estimates the costs associated with conducting a multimedia public education campaign (including media such as television, radio, newspapers, magazines, internet websites and mobile digital devices, and outdoor advertising such as signs or billboards) to be \$2,500,000. These costs include advertising in English and other languages as required by the language assistance provisions of the Federal Voting Rights Act.

Based on past practice, the Division requests a two-year appropriation covering FY24 and FY25 costs if this legislation passes.

Additionally, the following regulations would need to be repealed or amended:

- 6 AAC 25.010 – amend to changes to poll watchers
- 6 AAC 25.030 – remove reference to first choice rankings
- 6 AAC 25.033 – remove reference to special primary
- 6 AAC 25.070 – remove reference to ranking
- 6 AAC 25.071 – remove reg - counting of write-in votes in ranked choice tabulation
- 6 AAC 25.072 – remove reg - duplicate rankings
- 6 AAC 25.195 – remove reg – ranked choice voting tabulation results
- 6 AAC 25.200 – remove subsection – recounts for ranked choice
- 6 AAC 25.203 – remove reference to special primary
- 6 AAC 25.210 – add nominating petition candidates
- 6 AAC 25.212 – remove reference to special primary
- 6 AAC 25.225 – amend to include nominating petition candidates
- 6 AAC 25.260 – add nominating petition
- 6 AAC 25.300 – remove special primary
- 6 AAC 25.400 – remove special primary
- 6 AAC 25.500 – remove special primary
- 6 AAC 25.650 – remove special primary
- 6 AAC 25.670 – remove special primary and references to ranked choice voting
- 6 AAC 25.685 – remove special primary
- 6 AAC 25.686 – remove special primary

Further, the Division of Elections would need to adopt regulations that were repealed with the implementation of the ranked choice voting laws:

- 6 AAC 25.205 – Lt. Governor candidate nomination if no candidate nominated in party primary
- 6 AAC 25.20 – required number of signatures for no party candidacy in the first general after redistricting
