FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

BILL NO. SB 116

Analysis

This bill directs the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors to stipulate, through regulations, the criteria for associate counselor licensure; the types of associate counselor programs that are authorized for licensure; and the criteria for supervisor certification.

This legislation is expected to have an impact on Medicaid provider enrollment and compliance functions. The additional licenses are expected to increase volume and the level of effort to process new enrollment applications, revalidations, and background checks. In addition, Health Care Services anticipates an increased number of new applicants in out years due to this new license type. Post-payment review of services to ensure compliance with state and federal rules will need to be conducted; including establishing new review strategies within the Surveillance and Utilization Review (SUR) unit and working with current data-analytics vendors to develop compliance strategies and peer group comparison algorithms.

This bill removes the ability of the board to allow telephonic or electronic supervision of licensed professional counselors or associate counselors due to the remote location of the counselor.

Removing the ability of licensed professional counselors and associate counselors to receive telephonic or electronic supervision due to remote locations may decrease the number of licensed professional counselors and associate counselors who can become licensed and who reside and work in remote areas of the state.

In addition, the availability of licensed, credentialed supervisors who can offer supervision to licensed professional counselor candidates in remote/rural areas is limited. The removal of this provision will disproportionately impact rural areas of the state who are more likely to utilize distance supervision opportunities.

Should this bill pass, the Division of Behavioral Health and Health Care Services will need to amend regulations to add a new professional provider type.
