BILL NO. HB 363

Analysis

House Bill 363 would require the Office of Children's Services to request a court hearing when a child in state custody is placed in a psychiatric hospital, and requires the court to hold a hearing to review that placement within 30 days of the date that the child entered the facility. In addition, the court is required to hold a review hearing for such placements if they last longer than 90 days.

This bill could result in approximately 100 new court hearings to take place in child in need of aid cases each year. This will increase the workload and tasks for judges and court staff, but will not require additional staff or other resources. The court system will absorb the increase in workload, and therefore submits this zero fiscal note.
