

# **HB 236: UA Major Maintenance and Modernization Act**

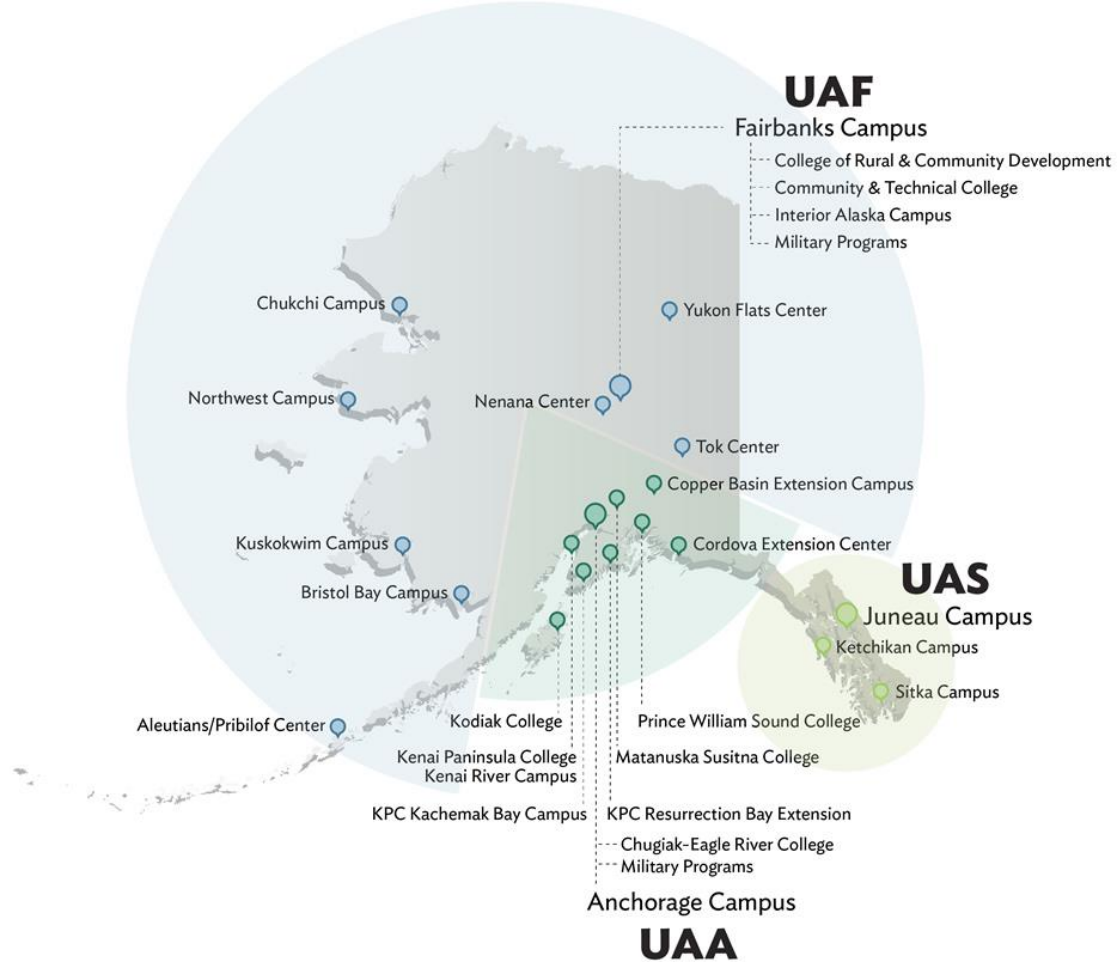

## PROBLEM:

- UA System has an extensive Deferred Maintenance (DM) backlog
  - 40% of Alaska state buildings are university-owned
  - 68% of Alaska's DM backlog is in the UA system
- Currently no clear fiscal plan for catching up on deferred maintenance projects

# Map of UA System





## HB 236's Solution:

- Create a reliable fund that the UA system can use to catch up on deferred maintenance projects
- Ensure the fiscally responsible expenditure of funds being used for deferred maintenance projects
- Maintain respect for legislative constitutional appropriation authority



### **Section 1:**

- Adds the duty for the Board of Regents to develop a comprehensive plan for applicable projects to be funded from the UA Major Maintenance and Modernization Fund

### **Section 2:**

- Adds the duty for the Board of Regents to present a detailed, written report to the Alaska Legislature within the first 30 days of each regular session about current and proposed major maintenance and modernization project.

### **Section 3:**

- Defines “major maintenance and modernization project”



### **Section 4:**

- Creates the UA Major Maintenance and Modernization Fund which will consist of:
  - Appropriations from the legislature
  - Transfers from the Board of Regents
  - Interest and investment income
  - Donations
- Establishes procedures in the event that the legislature disapproves of a proposed project
- States the intent of the legislature to appropriate \$35,000,000 /year
- Defines:
  - “Board of Regents”
  - “Fund”
  - “Major Maintenance and Modernization Project”



### **Section 5:**

- Repeals the UA Building Fund (AS 37.05.555)

### **Section 6:**

- Outlines current projects that the Board of Regents can leverage funds from the UA Major Maintenance and Modernization Fund without further appropriation

### **Section 7:**

- Provides for an immediate effective date

- Campuswide code compliance
- Improvements to welding, aviation, diesel tech and culinary facilities

- Kenai Peninsula College

- Mat-Su College
- Prince William Sound campus

### Building Improvements to:

- Professional Sciences Building
- Student Union
- Avis Alaska Sports Complex
- Consortium Library

- Heating system and generator upgrades
