Analysis

Harbors and state waters are littered with derelict vessels and finding owners can prove difficult at times for harbor masters and appropriate law enforcement. In 2018, the Alaska State Legislature passed the Derelict Vessels Act (SB92) which put stronger tracing controls on boats plying Alaska waters. The legislation inadvertently required vessels with a valid certificate of documentation with the United States Coast Guard to register with the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV). However, commercial fishing vessels are registered with the Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission (CFEC), and CFEC can help track down owners if necessary. The original bill created a duplicative registration requirement. This legislation does away with the duplicative registration but maintains a small \$8 fee on these vessels. The fees will go to the Department of Administration in part to help fund the Derelict Vessel Prevention Program fund established in AS 30.30.096. CFEC estimates the number of vessels at 4,700 annually.

Due to different registration rules, DMV collects fees for three years while CFEC collects fees annually. This legislation allows for a transition period for commercial fishing vessels that paid DMV for the three-year registration in 2022 to have their fees waived for 2024. For those vessels registered in 2023, fees will be waived for 2024 and 2025. This fiscal note projects the level of revenue by assuming a third of the projected annual total of \$37.6 will accrue in 2024, growing to two-thirds of that total in 2025 and finding a steady level by 2026.

CFEC will need to set up initial accounting controls, ask for proof of payment from vessel owners in the first two years of the transition, and make annual transfers to the Department of Administration similar to current transfers to the Department of Labor and Workforce Development for the Fishermen's Fund. The work increase is not significant and can be managed within current staff.

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
