RE: ANHB Support of House Concurrent Resolution 9

Dear Representative Prax,

The Alaska Native Health Board<sup>1</sup> (ANHB) writes in support of House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 9, recognizing the urgent need for parity in mental health and substance use disorder medical assistance benefits in Alaska. This resolution serves as the first step towards streamlining access to services statewide by addressing administrative burdens and advocating for regulatory changes to ensure parity between physical and behavioral health services.

Currently, the excessive administrative and clinical documentation requirements for behavioral health and substance use disorder services surpass those of medical care services. This unnecessary reporting and documentation burden detracts from direct patient care and leads to prolonged wait times for services; often individuals foregoing necessary treatment due to these delays. HCR 9 aims to address these issues by urging the Department of Health to adopt regulations that address administrative barriers and promote parity, facilitating access to critical mental health and substance use disorder services.

Even though Alaska, as a fee-for-service state, is not required to comply with the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Act of 2008 (MHPAEA), a federal law designed to prevent discriminatory benefit limitations on mental health or substance use disorder benefits compared to medical or surgical benefits, we support the Legislature in aligning with this federal standard. Under parity standard regulations, private insurers would be obligated to cover behavioral health services, thereby preventing insurers, including Medicaid, from creating obstacles for individuals seeking behavioral healthcare compared to physical healthcare. Thirty-seven other states—including other fee-for-service states such as Wyoming, Vermont, and Maine—have already adopted their own parity laws to ensure equitable access to behavioral health services.

This resolution comes at a critical time as the nation, including Alaska, experiences a rise in individuals with behavioral health and substance use treatment needs. It
