ALASKA'S MINING INDUSTRY

Community Benefits in 2022



\$1 billion spent on goods and services with 450+ local businesses.



\$55 million in local tax revenue to support services like libraries, road repairs, schools, and public safety.



\$131 million in state government revenue for services like education, highways, and airports.



\$266 million in royalty payments to Alaska Native Corporations; \$1.8 billion in total since 1989.

GIVING BACK!

Mining Provides:

- Charitable contributions to ~280 Alaska non-profits.
- \$4.5 million in contributions.
- \$800,000 to civic, business, and industry organizations in Alaska through sponsorship and membership fees.

Workforce Development:

- Over \$2.7 million contributed to the University of Alaska and vocational schools to support education in Alaska.
- Companies also invest in workforce development, on the job training, internships and scholarships.

MINING JOBS AND WAGES: KEEPING IT LOCAL

- 11,400 total direct, indirect, and induced jobs and \$1.0 billion in wages statewide.
- 73% average Alaska resident hire at the six large mines.
- Mining employees live in ~90 communities throughout Alaska (see below).






INVESTING FOR THE FUTURE

- \$645 million spent on exploration and development by Alaska's existing mines, mines in permitting, and advanced exploration projects.
- Since 1982, mining companies have invested \$8.1 billion in development of Alaska mining projects.
- Six major mines currently operate in Alaska.


