Analysis

This bill establishes the crime of interference with emergency communications. A person is guilty of interfering with emergency communications if they knowingly make repeated calls to an emergency communications center to report an incident that has already been reported and continues to call after being asked not to, makes repeated calls to an emergency communications center knowing that there is not an emergency, or threatens an emergency communications worker.
Interference with emergency communications is a class B misdemeanor.
It is unclear how many additional cases would be referred to the Criminal Division for prosecution if this bill were to pass. However, the targeted conduct is very specific and, therefore, the department does not anticipate that the potential increase in cases will have a fiscal impact.
