SB38 "An Act establishing the crime of interference with emergency communications."

The Alaska Joint Chapter of APCO and NENA support this legislation. Too often, communications centers are plagued with disruptions that this legislation formally addresses. Currently, law enforcement only has the ability to use other statutes such as harassment, false reporting, vandalism, and disorderly conduct, in an attempt to stop the interference when it occurs. In the past, these charges were usually dismissed by prosecuting attorneys because of the ambiguity of these statutes. This act clarifies these types of acts as related to the disruption of emergency communications.

This legislation provides a clear legal statute to arrest individuals for interference of emergency communications when a person disrupts emergency communications through repeated phone calls, intimidation, reporting emergencies that do not exist, and the destruction of communications equipment.

It is essential that the type of acts cited in SB38 be clearly codified in Alaska Statute to protect Alaska's emergency communications system, which includes 911 centers, communication centers, phone networks, and public safety radio communication networks.

The Alaska Joint Chapter of APCO and NENA represents over 150 emergency communications professionals working in approximately 40 communications centers throughout the State of Alaska.

As Chief of the Anchorage Police Department (APD), Alaska's largest law enforcement agency, I am writing in strong support of proposed legislation, SB38 Interference with Emergency Communications, which is being submitted to the State of Alaska for consideration. This legislation will help curtail blatant abuse of our 911 system and help dispatch emergency resources to those in need in the quickest manner possible.

I am very concerned by the misuse of our 911 system by repeat offenders. APD dispatchers deal with callers who knowingly abuse the system by calling repeatedly for the same non-emergencies and harass the call takers with vulgar words. When our dispatchers are occupied dealing with these types of callers, there is a potential for delay in the ability to answer calls for true emergencies, which can lead to a delay in emergency resource response. For these reasons, I fully support and encourage the legislation to prohibit interference with emergency communications, SB38, be written into law.

To Whom it May Concern,

The City of Wasilla is in full support of proposed Senate Bill 38 "An Act Establishing The Crime Of Interference With Emergency Communications." This legislation will restrain abuse of our 9-1-1 system and further assist in dispatching emergency resources in the most efficient fashion possible.

Repeat offenders who misuse our 9-1-1 system place an unnecessary burden upon operators and can lead to crucial delays in emergency resources and responses for actual emergencies. By instating regulations for interference with emergency communications it will aid in protecting our dispatchers and call takers while allowing them to be more effective.

Senate Bill 38 clearly outlines the violation of interference with emergency communications. The repeated misuse will be recognized as a criminal act of interference as well as identify offenders who: knowingly and repeatedly place 9-1-1 calls to report an issue which has already been reported; place repetitive calls to 9-1-1 when a true emergency does not exist; harasses and/or threatens a 9-1-1 dispatcher; and/or recognizes an individual who disrupts communications between 9-1-1 dispatchers and first responders.

Therefore, I am in full support of proposed Senate Bill 38 to prohibit interference with emergency communications and to aid in preventing abuse of our 9-1-1 system operations and efficiency.

As the Emergency Manager for the Matanuska-Susitna Borough Department of Emergency Services, I would like to take this opportunity to relay our support for the above-mentioned SB 38 Interference with Emergency Communications. This legislation will help curtail blatant abuse of our 911 system and help dispatch emergency resources to those in need in the quickest manner possible. Working in close partnership with the MatCom dispatch center, we see abuse and misuse of the emergency communications system regularly, and we would like to support a mechanism for combating this abuse and misuse.

When misuse and abuse occur on the emergency communications system, this affects not only call takers and dispatchers, but also affects other emergency callers trying to report actual emergencies, as well as affecting our 1st responder agencies. This can be seen in increased call answering times, call processing times, dispatch and response times, all of which are unacceptable when seconds counts. For these reasons, I fully support and encourage the legislation to prohibit interference with emergency communications, SB 38, be written into law.
