BILL NO. HB 106

Analysis

House Bill 106 creates a new criminal offense, Organized Theft, which would be a Class A felony (Section 1.) It also amends the current conduct that constitutes second degree theft, a B felony, to include theft of medical records or medical information (Section 2), and amends third degree theft, a C felony, to include mail theft (Section 3).

Since HB 106 makes additional types of conduct criminal offenses, it would lead to additional criminal cases being filed in the court system. The number of cases is unknown, but the court anticipates that it will not be substantial and that the increase in workload from the additional filings can be absorbed without fiscal impact. The court therefore submits this zero fiscal note.
