FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

BILL NO. HB 89

Analysis

This bill enables peace officers or concerned parties to seek protective orders against individuals believed to be a danger to themselves or others, from possessing, owning, purchasing, or receiving a firearm. Additionally, this bill creates a new misdemeanor crime of violating a gun violence protective order.

Generally, new crimes result in additional workload for the Office of Public Advocacy. However, the Agency is unable to predict the number of petitions that would be filed under this law and, of those, the number that would result in charges related to the violation of those protective orders. The Agency submits a zero fiscal note at this time but will request additional funding in future budget cycles if the legislation results in significant workload increases.
