FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS

Analysis

This legislation establishes gun violence protective orders in statute. A peace officer or household member may petition the court for a gun violence protective order if they reasonably believe that a person is a danger to themselves or others by possessing, owning, purchasing, or receiving a firearm. A violation of a gun violence protective order is a class A misdemeanor.

It is unclear how many additional cases will be generated by this legislation, however, the Criminal Division believes it can handle any increase in cases generated by this legislation within its existing budget. Therefore, the division submits a zero fiscal note.
