

## CHAPTER 84

## AN ACT

Relating to elections; and amending Ch. 76, SLA 1955.

(H.B. 256)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

Section 1. Sec. 1, Ch. 76, SLA 1955 is amended to read as follows:

**Sec. 1. Voting Without Loss of Pay:**

If a qualified voter does not have sufficient time outside of his working hours within which to vote at any Municipal or other local public election, he may, without loss of pay, take off as much working time as will, when added to his voting time outside his working hours, enable him to vote.

Any employer who refuses to allow any of his employees time off for the

purpose of voting or who, after allowing such time off, deducts the same from the employee's wages shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as set forth under Section 2.

If an employee has two consecutive hours in which to vote, either between the opening of the polls and the beginning of his regular working shift, or between the end of his regular working shift and the closing of the polls, he shall be deemed to have sufficient time outside of his working hours within which to vote.

## CHAPTER 85

## AN ACT

Relating to the supreme and superior courts of the state; amending Ch. 50, SLA 1959.

(H.B. 258)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:

Section 1. Sec. 10, Ch. 50, SLA 1959 is amended to read as follows:

**Sec. 10. Approval or Rejection.** Each supreme court justice shall be subject to approval or rejection as provided in the Alaska Election Code. If a majority of those voting on the question rejects his candidacy, he shall not for a period of four years thereafter be appointed to fill any vacancy in the

supreme or superior courts of the State.

Sec. 2. Sec. 26, Ch. 50, SLA 1959 is amended to read as follows:

**Sec. 26. Approval or Rejection.** Each superior court judge shall be subject to approval or rejection as provided in the Alaska Election Code. If a majority of those voting on the question rejects his candidacy, he shall not for a period of four years thereafter be appointed to fill any vacancy in the supreme or superior courts of the State.

## CHAPTER 86

## AN ACT

Relating to municipal taxation of intoxicating liquors; amending Sec. 35-4-18, ACLA 1949, as amended by Ch. 131, SLA 1957 and Ch. 197, SLA 1959.

(H.B. 263)

**Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:**

Section 1. Sec. 35-4-18, ACLA 1949 as amended by Ch. 131, SLA 1957 and Ch. 197, SLA 1959 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 35-4-18. **Municipal Regulations.** Incorporated municipalities may, by ordinance duly enacted, provide such rules and regulations governing the barter, sale and possession of intoxicating liquor within such municipali-

ties as may be deemed necessary to the orderly conduct of the business of selling intoxicating liquor; provided, however, that such ordinance or ordinances shall not be inconsistent with this Act or the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder, nor shall any municipality impose additional taxes other than property taxes on liquor inventories and sales taxes on liquor sales when such taxes are levied on other property and sales within the municipality.

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CHAPTER 87

AN ACT

**Authorizing the Department of Public Works to use part of an appropriation made to the Department of Administration for custodial services for other purposes; and providing for an effective date.**

(C.S.H.B. 285)

**Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:**

Section 1. The Department of Public Works is hereby authorized to use \$44,000 of the appropriation made to the Department of Administration for custodial services in Sec. 4, Ch. 200, SLA 1959 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1960. This amount shall be used by the Department of Public Works on the following projects:

(1) Repairing, rehabilitating and converting the boilers in the state capitol building, formerly known as the Federal and Territorial Building;

(2) Painting and roof repairs on the state building at the Sub-port, Juneau.

Sec. 2. This Act takes effect on the day after its passage and approval or on the day it becomes law without such approval.

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CHAPTER 88

AN ACT

**To provide for an Interstate Compact on Juveniles; to permit out-of-State supervision of a delinquent juvenile; to provide for the return to their home-state of runaways; to provide for the return of absconders and escapees; to authorize agreements for the cooperative institutionalization of special types of juveniles; and providing for an effective date.**

(H.B. 324)

**Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Alaska:**

Section 1. **Execution of Compact.** The Governor of the State of Alaska is hereby authorized and directed to execute a compact on the behalf of the State of Alaska with any other state or states

legally joining therein in the form substantially as follows:

**Interstate Compact on Juveniles  
That Contracting States Solemnly  
Agree:**
