

the productive utilization of the present population is hindered by the lack of an adequate airfield; and

WHEREAS the lack of an adequate airfield results in difficulty in shipping freight; and

WHEREAS the present airfield is well-used due to daily airmail flights and the service provided by five bush airlines and one scheduled commercial airline, but

these airplanes are very small and have limited load capacities; and

WHEREAS, because of the length of the Seldovia airfield, its use is restricted to very small aircraft;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that the Commissioner of Public Works is requested to extend the airfield at Seldovia.

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### HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 51

**Relating to the construction of an airstrip at Anchor Point.**

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled:**

WHEREAS there is no airstrip at Anchor Point; and

WHEREAS there is a need for daily flights of medium-sized aircraft to Anchor Point; and

WHEREAS the citizens of Anchor Point and the Division of Aviation have selected an appropriate airstrip site located on federal lands; and

WHEREAS the state requested this land from the Bureau of Land Management in November of 1961, but no action has been taken on the request;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that the Division of Aviation and the Division of Lands are requested to urge the U. S. Bureau of Land Management to convey the land at the proposed airstrip site to the state as quickly as possible.

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### HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 53

**Relating to the imposition of regulations limiting the number of crabpots in the area between Cape Suckling to Cape Spencer.**

**Be It Resolved by the House in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled:**

WHEREAS the waters off Cape Suckling south to Cape Spencer abound with Dungeness Crab, species cancer magister; and

WHEREAS no limitation presently exists which controls the number of crabpots that may be set for the harvesting of the Dungeness Crab, species cancer magister, from Cape Suckling to Cape Spencer; and

WHEREAS a limitation in the number of crabpots should be set so as to properly

conserve this natural resource; and

WHEREAS the number of crabpots permissible in this region for each single registration should be fixed at a maximum of 250 crabpots so as to equalize and conserve the harvest in relation to other areas of the state;

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, that the Board of Fish and Game is urged to promulgate commercial fishing rules and regulations limiting the number of crabpots for the harvesting of Dungeness Crab, species cancer magister, to 250 crabpots in the waters off Cape Suckling south to Cape Spencer.
