(2) When the Governor has signed the tentatively enrolled copy, the enrolling clerk will prepare it in a form suitable for use by the printer. The printer's copy will be proofread against the tentatively

enrolled copy and when approved will be signed by the certifying officers of each house as the official enrolled version of the Act and transmitted through the Governor to the Secretary of State for permanent filing.

Relating to the adjournment sine die of the Second Regular Session of the Second Legislature.

Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled, the House Concurring:

WHEREAS the work of the Second Legislature, Second Session, is nearing an end; and

WHEREAS Uniform Rules of Procedure 79 and 80 require concurrence by both

houses for adjournment and adjournment sine die at the end of the second regular session of a legislature;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Second Regular Session of the Second Legislature adjourn sine die no later than midnight, Pacific Standard Time, April 12, 1962.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 37

Relating to a study on methods of improving the legislative process.

Be It Resolved by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session Assembled, the House Concurring:

WHEREAS four years of experience with the workload and other facets of annual legislative sessions indicates a need for a reappraisal and possible revision of time schedules; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of improving the legislative process and the legislative product, other states have considered and utilized split or recessed sessions to allow the public and members to review bills introduced and to give an opportunity for more considered committee work; and

WHEREAS suggestions from members

of the Legislature based upon their experience and from other state legislatures would be of interest and use to the Legislature in making changes in the scheduling and conduct of its work;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate in Second Legislature, Second Session assembled, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislative Council is directed to make a study and report on suggestions for facilitating the work and improving the legislative product through the use of split or recessed sessions, changes in convening dates, and pre-filing and bill introduction deadlines, and report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature in January of 1963.
