SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 33

Relating to the defective and inadequate water supply of the villages of Larsen Bay, Chenega, and Tatitlek.

Be It Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS the defective and inadequate water supply of the villages of Larsen Bay, Chenega, and Tatitlek is jeopardizing the general health and welfare of the citizens of these villages; and

WHEREAS Tatitlek has a new school which is placing an increased burden on an already inadequate plumbing and sewage facility and on the limited water supply; and

WHEREAS the villages have asked assistance from the Alaska Native Health Service in Anchorage; and

WHEREAS the Alaska Native Health Service has not acted upon their request;

and

WHEREAS the situation is getting worse with the passage of time and the increasing population in both areas;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, and the Surgeon General, United States Public Health Service, are respectfully urged to study and assist in correcting the defective and inadequate water supply before a great health problem arises; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Honorable Anthony J. Celebrezze, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare; the Honorable Luther L. Terry, Surgeon General, United States Public Health Service; and to the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 34

Relating to stationing a public health nurse at Wainwright.

Be It Resolved by the Senate:

WHEREAS there are about 450 people living in the village of Wainwright, Alaska; and

WHEREAS no one in the village has any medical training, and the nearest medical assistance is at Barrow, 100 air miles away; and

WHEREAS distance and adverse weather conditions make both travel and communication difficult and uncertain; and

WHEREAS, even when radio advice concerning the sick and injured can be obtained from Barrow, there is no one in Wainwright with enough training to make

effective use of it; and

WHEREAS these conditions severely jeopardize the health and safety of the inhabitants of Wainwright;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, and the Surgeon General, United States Public Health Service, are respectfully urged to station a nurse at Wainwright to provide some measure of protection for the health of the inhabitants of this important village; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.
