## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 121

Relating to the construction of additional school facilities at Kwethluk.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS, during the summer of 1972, the Bureau of Indian Affairs plans on constructing a new kindergarten classroom and quarters for teachers which would be attached to the rear of the existing Bureau of Indian Affairs School; and

WHEREAS because Kwethluk is not incorporated nor located in an incorporated area, the Bureau of Land Management has indicated that no changes in the school reserve boundary can be made without legislative approval; and

WHEREAS to carry out the planned construction it is necessary to add a strip of land to the Bureau of Indian Affairs school reserve in Kwethluk; and

WHEREAS the proposed construction site for the additional structures has been approved by the citizens of Kwethluk;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska Legislature that it approves the addition of the necessary land to the Bureau of Indian Affairs school reserve in Kwethluk to permit the construction of the planned additional school facilities at the rear of the existing school, said addition to be accomplished by the Bureau of Land Management closing 12th Street north of Kwethluk Street to the Kwethluk River of Tract A, U.S. Survey 4221, Townsite of Kwethluk, Alaska, and adding this land to the Kwethluk Bureau of Indian Affairs school reserve; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature requests the Bureau of Indian Affairs to grant a 20-foot easement along the east

side of 12th Street from Kwethluk Street to lots 10, 11 and 14 of the Townsite of Kwethluk, for access to the property.

Bruce, Commissioner, Bureau of Indian Affairs; the Honorable Boyd L. Rasmussen, Director, Bureau of Land Management; and to the Honorable Ted Stevens and the Honorable Mike Gravel, U.S. Senators, and the Honorable Nick Begich, U.S. Representative, members of the Alaska delegation in Congress.
