"An Act relating to civil actions; amending Alaska Rules of Civil Procedure 11, 49, 52, 58, 68, and 82; and providing for an effective date."

was read the first time and referred to the Labor and Commerce Committee, the Judiciary Committee and the Finance Committee.

SB 378

SENATE BILL NO. 378 by the Rules Committee by request of the Governor, entitled:

"An Act placing certain physicians employed by the Department of Corrections the exempt service; and providing for an effective date."

was read the first time and referred to the State Affairs Committee, the Judiciary Committee and the Finance Committee.

Three zero fiscal notes were attached. Analysis from the Department of Corrections, Administrative Services: "This bill will make it possible for the Department of Corrections to take advantage of a program administered by the National Health Services Corps (NHSC) under which NHSC assigns fully trained physicians at a reduced cost. It is anticipated that this bill will result in a savings in the cost of medical services. The amount of savings is hard to determine at this time. However, it will necessitate the creation of physician positions to provide services currently provided under contract. The earliest date that the Department will be able to take advantage of this would be July of 1987."

SB 378 cont'd

Analysis from Department of Law, Administrative Services: "This bill places physicians provided to the Department of Corrections by the National Health Service Corps in the exempt service. This program, that places physicians in designated health manpower shortage areas, such as certain state corrections facilities, will not have an impact on the Department of Law's operations."

Analysis from Department of Administration: "This bill has no fiscal impact on the Department of Administration."

Governor's transmittal letter dated January 31:

Dear Senator Bennett:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill placing certain physicians employed by the Department of Corrections in the exempt service.

Placing these physicians in the exempt service will give the department the flexibility necessary for participation in a federal program administered by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, through the National Health Services Corps (NHSC). The program places physicians in designated health staffing shortage areas. Specific institutions within Alaska's correctional system have been so designated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services under the authority of sec. 332 of the Public Health Services Act (42 U.S.C. sec. 254e), making the state eligible to participate in the program.

Under the program, NHSC may assign physicians, fully trained in internal medicine, to designated correctional institutions. The physicians are then committed to work in that institution for a specific period of time, ranging from two to three years. However, under the program, participating physicians first deal directly with the correctional agency regarding the specifics of their potential employment, including salary level. The negotiations, and final selection, take place during a relatively short time period set by the federal program. Placing these physicians in the exempt service will allow the department to set the salaries at the appropriate level, and work within the set time frame.

This valuable program will provide much-needed physician services, at a lower cost than that of current contract services, for a definite period of time. I urge your prompt and favorable action on the bill.

SB 379

SENATE BILL NO. 379 by the Rules Committee by request of the Governor, entitled:

"An Act relating to the premium tax for domestic insurers."

was read the first time and referred to the Labor and Commerce Committee and the Finance Committee.

Fiscal note is in Senate Supplement No. 47.

Governor's transmittal letter dated January 31:

Dear Senator Bennett:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the premium tax paid by domestic insurers.

Under present law, AS 21.09.210(b) provides that domestic insurers pay premium tax at the rate of one and one-half percent of gross premiums, while nondomestic companies pay three percent of gross premiums. A recent U.S. Supreme Court case, Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. v. Ward, U.S., 53 U.S.L.W. 4699 (June 10, 1985), raises serious questions concerning the constitutionality of the differential rate structure. In order to correct this problem and not jeopardize our premium tax laws, this bill will eliminate the preference for domestic insurers by standardizing the rate at three percent for both categories of insurance companies. The bill has the further benefit of raising the total amount of premium taxes collected. I urge your support of this bill.

Governor's transmittal letter dated January 31:

Dear Senator Bennett:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the insurance requirements for commercial vehicles. This bill addresses the serious problems that surfaced as a result of recent legislation, ch. 104, SLA 1985.

As a result of the 1985 legislation, which established statutory minimum security amounts, a number of small truckers are being put out of business due to exorbitant insurance rates caused by the new requirements. This bill amends AS 28.33.010 to remove the statutory insurance requirements, and instead require the Department of Public Safety to adopt regulations to set these insurance requirements for commercial vehicles.

This bill is very important to the truckers of this state, and I urge your prompt and favorable action on this measure.
